WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer has risen in all districts, except over the Pacific states. The highest pressure was over the north states, northern plateau, Assiniboia, and the extreme northwest; and the lowest pressure was over the lake region. Precipitation was reported over portions of Utah, Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, South Dakota, Minnesota, New Mexico, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, British Columbia, Alberta, and Assiniboia. It was snowing at times of morning report at Rapid City, S. D., and Chicago, Ill.

The temperature changes were slight except a decided fall over portions of Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada, Montana, North Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Manitoba and Assiniboia. The temperature was below zero over the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys and Central Canadian provinces, and zero in Wyoming.

MUCH EXPECTED OF CONVENTION.

Splendid Outlook for Big Gathering of Sunday School Workers—Tonight and Tomorrow.

FIRST SESSION IN THE THEATER

Punctuality To Be Observed At All The Meetings—Program for Stake Schools.

Indications point to a very successful Sunday school convention in this city tonight and tomorrow. As stated in last evening's "News," the first meeting occurs at 7:30 tonight in the Salt Lake Theater. Delegates, to be admitted, must present their tickets at the door and they will be given seats in the building according to their arrival, the first coming being first served. The doors will open at 7 o'clock, at which time the program for the schools of the city will be presented.

It is desired that those attending be promptly on time, as one feature of Sunday school work—punctuality—will be strictly observed at all the meetings. The program will be an interesting one and of a character calculated to please and instruct all present. The attendance of delegates is quite large and those from outside points were escorted to places of entertainment in Salt Lake and Granite Stakes this afternoon.
