The new line is ready for operation now, but there remains considerable ballasting to be done to the curb, the double track running to J street. The company has done some heavy grading and is getting the street above Sixth avenue and along Ninth avenue into fine condition.

LECTURERS AT EXPOSITION.

Merrill, Judd and Taylor Are Named By the Governor.

Lecturers and exhibitors to present the exhibit from Utah at the United States Land Irrigation exposition to be held at Chicago next month were selected at a meeting of the local committee in the office of Governor Spry yesterday afternoon. They are L. A. Merrill, Thomas Judd and J. Edward Taylor.

Frank S. Young proposed a scheme to exhibit Utah by moving pictures, which the committee looked upon favorably. The pictures will consist of a film 2,000 feet long, showing the recent Taft review of the children on Brigham street, and scenes of the Q. M. hospital, and another 2,000 feet showing dry farming on a big scale, the beet sugar industry, salt refining and other scenes of Utah. This was to cost \$500 or \$550 to insure its presentation in Chicago. Utah will be allotted one hour each day for lectures, and this scheme was proposed to fill that time.

The committee has only \$500 to make the display as Chicago, and the moving picture proposition was not accepted yesterday, though it may be later.
