## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Poultry Fanciers Meet**—The Utah State Poultry association will meet tomorrow evening at the Commercial club.

**Free Kindergarten Attendance**—The free kindergarten reports an enrollment of 40 children, and an average attendance of 25 during the past month. A morning luncheon of crackers and milk is given the children.

**Fires on Power Water**—A. W. Gallagher of this city files application with the state engineer for six second feet of water from Middle Canyon creek in Tooele county, to be used for electric purposes, with 200 horse power.

**Discussing Removal**—The directors of the Manufacturers' association are meeting this afternoon to consider the removal to the Vermont building in west South Temple street, corner of Richards, and where the association will have a fine display.

**Van Pelt Qualifies**—Henry V. Van Pelt, who was elected a member of the city board of education Tuesday evening as a member from the First ward, to succeed Byron Cummings, resigned, qualified before Clerk Judd yesterday afternoon and is now ready to take up his duties as a member of the board.

**Cattleman Invited to See Specimen**—Dr. A. C. Young, state veterinarian, has secured several cultures of lip and leg ulcers which have been found among cattle throughout the state. Dr. Young is desirous of having the stockmen in the city call at his office so that he can talk to them about the prevention and cure of the disease. His office is at 217 Judge building.

**Line Nearly Ready**—Ninth avenue is being made into a boulevard with roadway as smooth as the traditional barn floor. The new line is ready for operation now, but there remains considerable ballast to be done to the north track, the double track running to J street. The company has done some heavy grading and is getting the street above Sixth avenue and along Ninth avenue into line condition.

**To Dedicate Federal Heights**—Members of the city council were shown over Federal Heights yesterday afternoon by A. M. Vrench, manager of the Telluride Realty company, owners of the Heights. A map of the addition will be filed with the city engineer, dedicating certain streets, parks and alleys in this addition to the city. The streets are paved with petroleum pavement, and the sidewalks and sewers are all in. These will be included in the dedication to the city, and represent an expenditure of \$125,000.

**Want Sidewalks or Lights**—Residents of Eleventh West street want either sidewalks or lights in their immediate vicinity, and a petition is presented to the council once more for one or the other. The engineering department has surveyed the section for sidewalks, but operations got no further than the driving of stakes in the middle of the walks, over which people fell in the darkness and were frequently injured. ## LAST RITES TO JOS. T. RICHARDS

Chief Justice Straup and Bishop Whitney Render Feeling and Comforting Tributes.

The last loving rites were paid to the memory of Joseph T. Richards yesterday, at the home of his father on A street. The spacious parlors, halls, porch and staircase were crowded with friends who came to pay their tributes of respect to the departed, and on every hand marks of sympathy and affection were evidenced. The proceedings were in charge of Bishop T. A. Clauson of the Eighteenth ward, and the speakers were Chief Justice Straup and Bishop O. F. Whitney. Judge Straup paid a brief but feeling tribute to Mr. Richards, legal attainments, his social qualities, and his fine traits of manhood, while Bishop Whitney made a beautiful address, full of tributes to the beloved ones, and ending with a quotation from the beautiful poem, whose closing lines are:

"And if, through patient toil, we reach the land,  
Where the feet with sandals loosed,  
May rest,  
Where we shall clearly know and understand—  
I think that we shall say—'God knew the best.'"

The music of the occasion was furnished by Messrs. Pyper, Whitney, Ensign and Shepherd, with Spencer Clauson, Jr., as accompanist. It was especially interesting as it included two numbers by Mr. F. Dewey Richards, brother of the deceased. These numbers were "The Land of the Living," sung by Mrs. Snyder, and "The Guiding Star," rendered by Mr. Ensign. The prayers were pronounced by Elders Samuel W. Richards and Henry P. Richards, while the grave was dedicated by Elder George F. Richards, all three close relatives of the deceased. The pallbearers were gentlemen who had been Mr. Richards' intimate friends in life: Governor Wells, Mayor Bransford, W. Mont Perry, Col. E. S. Perry, Attorney Hamer, and D. S. Spencer.

Mr. F. Dewey Richards, who came from New York to attend the funeral, said that he had known Mr. Richards for many years, and that he was a man of great character and high standing.
