establish a colony in Mexico. It is reported M. Krazewski, Polish author, who with others was recently arrested, was connected with a conspiracy siming at a general rising in Russian and Prussian Poland.

The trial of the staff of the news-paper Independent for blackmall caused a great sensation here. Four members of the staff were sentence ed to imprisonment from one to six years. They obtained great sums of money through their schemes. The chief of the gang was named Von Schleinitz; he was formerly a mem-ber of the Imperial Guard. He fled.

The chief proposal contained in the last note of Cardinal Jacobini, Papal Secretary of State, to Prassia, is that the Vatican will recognize is that the Valican will recognize the duty of notifying the Prussian government of clerical appoint-ments, on condition that Prussia declares the exercise of all priestly functions exempt from prosecution, and the training of priests free from and the training of priests free from all restrictions. The note indicates the willingness of the Vatican to continue negotiations not withstanding Prussia's violation of diplomatic usage by passing a church bill while the negotiations were pending.
