CONTROL OF GRAZING LANDS.

In Two Hundred Replies to Letters on The Subject Writers Express Themselves in Favor of It.

Denver, Colo., June 2 .- Gov. Henry A. Buchtel, who issued the call in accordance with resolutions adopted by the general assembly of Colorado, fo the public lands convention, to be held in Denver June 19 and 20, declared to day that there shall be no politics injected into the gathering If he can prevent it. When he sent out the call he distinctly and emphatically stated that the purpose of the convention was in no way to antagonize President Roosevelt ond his administration with reference to the public land question. The program the public land question. The program propared for the convention, by a com-mittee of which United States Senator Teller is chairman, provides for the shaping of a more liberal policy to be submitted to Congress for the enact-ment of laws which will make for the development of the western states by bringing more people to them to take up lands and till them. "Are you familiar with the system of general grazing of live stock on forest feserves, and do you approve tt? If how that are your objections and what would you suggest."
