

COMING PUBLIC LANDS CONVENTION

Gov. Buchtel Says no Politics Will Be Injected Into it if He Can Prevent It.

CONTROL OF GRAZING LANDS.

In Two Hundred Replies to Letters on The Subject Writers Express Themselves in Favor of It.

Denver, Colo., June 2.—Gov. Henry A. Buchtel, who issued the call in accordance with resolutions adopted by the general assembly of Colorado, for the public lands convention, to be held in Denver June 19 and 20, declared today that there shall be no politics injected into the gathering if he can prevent it. When he sent out the call he distinctly and emphatically stated that the purpose of the convention was in no way to antagonize President Roosevelt and his administration with reference to the public land question. The program prepared for the convention, by a committee of which United States Senator Teller is chairman, provides for the shaping of a more liberal policy to be submitted to Congress for the enactment of laws which will make for the development of the western states by bringing more people to them to take up lands and till them.

The American National Stockgrowers' association, whose last convention endorsed the grazing and forestry policies of the administration, will be a factor in the coming convention.

Secy. T. W. Tomlinson of the association has been sending a canvass by letter of the members on the questions to come before the convention. Some of the questions he put to them were:

"Do you favor some form of government control of the public grazing lands under regulations that will fit the conditions for your district?"

"What arrangements will be best suited to your section—an absolute lease of the grazing rights, or a permit to run live stock on the public lands with proper protection?"

"Are you familiar with the system of general grazing of live stock on forest reserves, and do you approve it? If not what are your objections and what would you suggest?"

To 1,000 letters Mr. Tomlinson has received nearly 200 replies, and they are favorable to some plan of government control and regulation of all public lands in nine cases out of ten. Most of them want the government leasing system with fencing privileges. Some want grazing permits from the government. Ninety per cent of them believe that government control will give the little, as well as the big, stockgrowers a square deal.

INCREASED MEMBERSHIP OF FEDERATION OF MINERS.

Denver, June 2.—An increase of 10,000 in the membership of the Western Federation of Miners will be shown by the reports to be received at the annual convention which will meet in Denver June 10 next. The executive board meets here tomorrow to audit the accounts and report on the membership matters. In the absence of President Charles H. Meyer, who is in prison in Idaho awaiting trial on the charge of complicity in the murder of former Gov. Frank Steunenberg, E. Mahoney, first vice president, will preside. James Kirwan is acting secretary-treasurer in place of William D. Haywood, who is in jail at Boise for the Steunenberg murder.

The other members of the executive board are J. C. Lowrey, Butte; Marion W. Moore, Maricopa, Arizona; Frank Schmeizer, Silverton, Colo.; Ernest Mills, Greenwood, B. C.; and Joseph E. Hutchinson, Burke, Idaho.

About 200 delegates, the largest number in the history of the federation, are expected to attend the convention. The states that will be represented are California, Colorado, Nevada, Missouri, Washington, Oregon, British Columbia and Alaska. There will be two foreign delegates from Alaska.

"Nearly every member of the federation," said Acting Secy. Kirwan today, "has secured an increase of wages during the past year. In addition, an eight-hour day has been established in districts where the 10 and 12-hour day was in force. We have had a number of strikes during the year and were successful in winning all of them. Several are on now, but we are confident of an agreement that will be satisfactory to the federation."

S. P. TRAIN WRECKED.

One Man Killed, Score of Persons Injured, Some Fatally.

San Antonio, Tex., June 2.—One man was instantly killed and a score of persons injured, some of them fatally, by the wrecking of passenger train No. 3 this morning two miles west of Laredo, a small station on the Southern Pacific.

The derailment was the result either of a train wreckers or defective steel, though the positive cause had not been determined late tonight.

The train was dashing along at a speed of from 40 to 45 miles an hour when the derailment occurred. Every car on the train was derailed, two of them turning over.

OHIO SOCIALISTS

Adopt Resolutions of Sympathy for Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone.

Columbus, Ohio, June 2.—The Socialist party of Ohio at the closing session of its state convention here today adopted resolutions extending sympathy to Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone, officials of the Western Federation of Miners, accused of complicity in the assassination of Gov. Steunenberg of Idaho, and denouncing President Roosevelt and Secy. Tatt.

Among the delegates who sat in the convention was Harry Wells, a son of the late founder of the city of Wellsville, Ohio, and a nephew of Senator Foraker. The resolutions adopted are in part as follows:

"Whereas, the Socialist prophecy of a class struggle has crystallized into a definite class war in the western states as shown by the prosecution of Comrades Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone, against whom the capitalist class is using all the weapons in its armory—namely, biased judges, a prostituted press, military force and Pinkerton detectives, to crush the labor movement; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the Socialist party of Ohio, in convention assembled, do support with unwavering fidelity our comrades, Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone, during their trial. Further, be it

Resolved, That we denounce the action of the first servant of the people, Theodore Roosevelt, in sending his errand boy, Taft, to Idaho and denouncing Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone.

"Resolved, That we call upon the working class to remove by its votes not only this political mountebank, but all others of his ilk."

BRYAN WOULD ACCEPT ANOTHER NOMINATION.

Richmond, Va., June 2.—In an interview tonight, William J. Bryan declared that the matter of section 3 of the constitution, which bars a man from being nominated for the presidency by the Democratic party. He explained why he could not regard President Roosevelt as a Democrat, and said that under certain conditions he (Bryan) would be a candidate for the nomination; that is, if his party demanded it and if he considered it for the good of the party.

At dinner tonight were Gov. Swanson, Gov. Warfield of Maryland, Senator Daniel, Mr. Bryan and a dozen others. Mr. Bryan declared that President Roosevelt was neither a Democrat nor wholly a Republican.

"He is not consistently Democratic or consistently Republican," Mr. Bryan declared.

On the matter of a 2-cent rate, Mr. Bryan was outspoken, declaring that he was the first to advance the idea that interstate rates should be no more than the total of the various state rates.

OMAHA COM'L CLUB.

Starts on Excursion to the West and Northwest.

Omaha, June 2.—One hundred members of the Omaha Commercial club, accompanied by Gov. George L. Sheldon as their guest, started this evening on a 16 days' excursion to the northwest. They will take in the principal towns of Utah, Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon. They have an especially equipped train of eight cars.

RAILWAY WRECKS.

Too Much Business, Too Much Hurry, Too Few Employees the Cause.

Cleveland, O., June 2.—Grand Master P. H. Morrison of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, in discussing railway wrecks and their cause and remedy, said today:

"There is too much business for the railroads; too much hurry in conducting trains and too few employees to insure the proper degree of safety to employee and traveler.

"The state railways of Germany employ more than three times the number of men per mile that we do, and none can say that this does not contribute to safety. Every advance in wages here is met by counter economies in

operation, such as taking off men, etc.

"The American railway managers as a class are capable and practical men. It is not their fault that things are as they are. It is the fault of the system. If they do not get the results in operation they are to be sidetracked. What, in my opinion, the American railway systems need to insure greater safety is more men to man and inspect the trains, to guard the switches and semaphores and to control the tracks."

S. A. R. CONVENTION.

Denver, June 2.—Special religious services at St. Mark's Episcopal church, with an address by Rev. John H. Houghton, the rector, marked the opening of the eighteenth annual congress of the national organization of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The S. A. R. is the largest patriotic genealogical organization of men in this country. The national society has just been incorporated under a special act of Congress and one of the most important pieces of legislation that will come before the congress is the adoption of a constitution for the society as incorporated.

There will be a number of noted men present at the gathering, including Gov. Edward Warfield of Maryland, Gen. Francis H. Franklin, Murphy, New Jersey; Judge James D. Hancock, Pa.; Col. R. W. Guthrie, Pittsburgh; Gen. Thomas M. Anderson, Portland, Or.; Hon. William J. Van Patten, Burlington, Vt.; Maj. Macveigh, Philadelphia; and Judge John S. Smith, Minneapolis.

President Roosevelt and William J. Bryan, who are members of the organization, have sent regrets at their inability to attend.

A new president-general and all other national officers will be elected. Moses Greene Parker of Massachusetts is a candidate for president-general to succeed the present head of the national society, Cornelius A. Pugsley of New York.

MILLIONAIRE DROPS DEAD.

Charlotte, N. C., June 2.—While purchasing a ticket in the union station at Asheville, P. M. Westfeldt, member for the New Orleans coffee firm of Westfeldt Bros. fell to the floor and expired instantly. ENGLAND TICKLES JAPAN.

MAJ. J. J. B. DUBOIS DEAD.

Denver, Colo., June 2.—Major J. J. B. Dubois, a well known horse breeder, died of heart failure at his farm, seven miles west of this city, this afternoon.

SULTAN'S TROOPS REBEL.

Tangier, June 2.—A serious mutiny of the sultan's troops at Casablanca has broken out. The rebels are over the non-payment of the men. The mutineers attempted to seize merchandise lying in the custom-house, but the authorities succeeded in preventing this by paying the men half of the amount due them.

CARGO JETTISONED.

London, June 1.—The British bark Grenada, Captain Elston, bound from San Francisco for Liverpool, while passing Kinsale, today signaled that she had experienced a hurricane, during which she was thrown on her beam ends and damaged, and it became necessary to jettison the vessel's cargo and cut away the sails.

CROPS MUCH DAMAGED.

El Paso, Tex., June 2.—Over \$100,000 damage has been caused by the breaking of the Rio Grande levees at White's spur, 15 miles above here. More than 100,000 acres of land are under water and many families have been driven from their homes.

KANSAS CITY FIRE.

CROKER'S AMBITION.

Said He Wants to Go to Parliament As a Nationalist.

London, June 2.—The newspapers are re-echoing the report that Richard Croker, the Irish-American millionaire, is to enter parliament as an Irish Nationalist member. Recently Mr. Croker has taken an interest in the work of the Nationalists, made contributions to the party funds, lent automobiles for electioneering purposes and identified himself with the party by appearing on the platform at a recent convention in Dublin. It is doubtful, however, Mr. Croker would be willing to forego his American citizenship and more doubtful if he could find a constituency desiring to take him up as a candidate, or if the party leaders will welcome the acquisition of a politician of such a masterful figure.

Another of the Irish Nationalists mentioned to the Associated Press that the party would not welcome any attempt to introduce an "American machine" method into its politics.

Mr. Croker's health, moreover, is a barrier to his attempt to enter the work of any sort. He shows the weight of his 61 years, although he is still vigorous. His recent illness was more than the published reports indicated. ADMIRAL COGHLAN

FAVORS BIG NAVY.

New York, June 2.—Admiral Joseph B. Coghlan, who retired from the navy Saturday, in a published interview today, after advocating a big navy for this country, makes a plea for what he deems an important reform. He said:

"There is one important reform which our navy should adopt. The law of promotion should be promptly changed so as to give our senior officers more opportunity for actual practice in the handling of fleets. As it is now an officer is well along toward the 30-year mark before he reaches the grade of captain and gets command of a single ship. By the time he makes his 30-year mark he is not fit to handle a big squadron of war vessels, he is about ready to quit the service altogether."

"This is absolutely wrong. You cannot educate a naval officer on theory alone. You must give him practice as well. A man can study in books the art of running an automobile, but if he tries it he finds himself at the bottom of a ditch or in some one's backyard. This is equally true of the fleet commander called upon to maneuver a squadron of warships in the last year of two of his active service."

"In this test of trial and error the American officers (all short of perfection) are in nothing else. They are men of education, but they lack the practical experience that must be given more time to master the practical part of their duties."

CULEBRA CUT.

Excavation for Month of May Fell Off Fifteen Per Cent.

HORSE THIEF SHOT.

Van Wert, O., June 2.—A man supposed to be Marvin Kuhn, the notorious horse thief, who was pardoned from the Ohio state prison at Columbus for a horse-stealing charge, was shot and killed today. Kuhn was shot three times and fatally wounded this evening after a chase of 10 miles across the state. Kuhn was riding a horse and two farmers who had followed him from near St. Mary's, Anguize county, where he had stolen a horse and buggy, belonging to Arthur J. Smith. The man was shot in the right shoulder and in the left hip. The shot in the right arm also shot off. The doctor stated he would not live until morning. The wounded man was identified by the officers as Kuhn, who was a horse thief and was also by clippings which were found in his pocketbook, telling of Kuhn's pardon from the penitentiary.

VOLIVA'S FOLLOWERS.

Two Thousand of Them Rise and Pledge Allegiance to Him.

San Francisco, June 1.—W. A. Forgy, a strikebreaker in the employ of the United Railroads, was shot and fatally wounded at Van Ness street and Turk street at 11 o'clock tonight by Special Officer W. J. Blomberg of the Humane society. Forgy opened fire on a crowd of strikers gathered in front of the building, and a companion as strikebreaking carmen and who had pursued the two men for several blocks. TROUBLE FOR DINAN.

Grand Jury Will Investigate His Conduct in Matter of Veniemen.

San Francisco, June 1.—A special session of the grand jury will be held this afternoon at which Chief of Police Jeremiah Dinan will be upon the carpet. It does not lie within the power of the grand jury to oust the chief, but it can file charges and place evidence in the hands of the police commission or the courts which may compel action.
