

GOV. CUTLER'S ADDRESS AT THE IRRIGATION CONGRESS

The following address was delivered by Gov. John C. Cutler before the National Irrigation Congress at Sacramento this week:

From Salt Lake, the "City of the Saints," the cradle of Utah, we first turned on the thirsty soil of the Salt Lake valley. The sturdy plowmen little thought, perhaps, that this simple act of theirs marked the beginning of one of the greatest and most important epochs in the development of our nation. The epoch of arid land reclamation, the epoch of irrigation, had begun, and the results flowing from it we can not foresee, any more than we can predict the volume of the mighty rivers from the size of the rain drop.

"How while Utah claims this distinction, and has been doing it since the first act of irrigation, she is still a pupil at the feet of others. Utah has learned much of the science of irrigation from California and other states. For all this we are grateful. And we thank Utah has taught something of this science to others. I am pleased that she is able to do this, and learn from us, we grow and progress in strength through mutual help and teaching. Utah is more than willing to join with other communities in striving for the advancement of the art of irrigation."

SUGAR BEETS AND IRRIGATION.

"While on the subject of Utah's part in the development of irrigation, I wish to mention a pioneer movement which originated in our state within the past few years. I refer to the growing of sugar beets by irrigation. Utah claims the honor of first instituting this great industry in the United States. At first on a small scale, then gradually and rapidly increasing in extent until now thousands of acres of beets are harvested annually in the state, from which millions of pounds of sugar are made. And yet the industry is in its infancy, although it has spread into the surrounding states. It requires no

lively imagination to look forward to the time when many of you will live and die, and which I hope to live to see, when by means of irrigation enough sugar will be made in the arid west to supply the demands of the entire country. The importance of this movement can not be computed, any more than its extent and development can be predicted."

BIRTH OF IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

"One more cause of gratification on behalf of Utah, I remember the time some years ago when not a body of enterprising and determined men met in Salt Lake City and organized this congress. It was indeed fitting that the state which gave birth to irrigation in our nation should be chosen as the birth-place of the National Irrigation congress. If it is the will of the congress, I wish the fact that Utah first applied the principle of irrigation to sugar beet raising and first manufactured the beets into sugar with exclusively American-made machinery, I think I may be pardoned if, in conjunction with my fellow-delegates from Utah, I say some words of our state's achievements. And we are grateful as well that these ideas have been adopted elsewhere, and that Utah has learned and is still learning so much from other states."

WHAT GOVERNMENT IS DOING.

"In this connection I am reminded of the great things the government is doing for us. All the time we have been looking to the general government for the most important and beneficial lessons. Through its help, irrigation the experiment has become irrigation the science. We are grateful for this help; and especially to our President Roosevelt, in whose administration the reclamation law was passed, and who has done so much to extend irrigation. I look over the field in Utah and see large reclamation projects already under way or proposed. I learn of other vast projects in sister states. I know that millions of acres are now in the way of being redeemed through these. I know that when

These projects are completed, others will be under way for the redeeming of other millions of acres. Every one of the farms thus made possible will be the seat of a home, the sanctuary of an American family. Realizing these things I am thankful for the system of paternal government. It is that expansion which means the taking up of wild lands without borders, the conquest which includes the victory over barrenness and uselessness; the wealth which flows from the watered field, the irrigated pasture, the newly made home. Thank God for the conquests in this direction so far made. And may this kind

of expansion continue through the efforts of this and similar organizations until the whole imperial extent of this land of ours shall be filled with contented homes and a happy, prosperous people.

WHAT IRRIGATION HAS DONE.

"What has irrigation done for this nation? It has bestowed upon it a fertile empire, the resources and wealth of which put to shame the boasted riches of Golconde. In extent an empire in wealth a realm, the region west of the Mississippi largely the gift of irrigation. We see the irrigation and rain, barren and unproductive desert and neglected, scorched by all the world. And then a miracle. Water was given to the soil, and all its fertility accumulated through ages, came into active being. Decked with the wealth brought forth by the marshy such as water, the west sprang forth into new life. That name gained upon her with astonished admiration. She had long been despised because of her barrenness. She now became the bride of the east and the mother of wealth and peoples.

UTAH IS GENEROUS.

"In conclusion I am authorized to say in behalf of Utah that we are inclined to be generous in the matter of carrying away prizes from this congress. While it is generally understood that we could, if we really tried, take everything that is worth taking, it is thought best to leave a few of the minor awards for some of the other states. My friend Mr. Kiesel is at first induced to be stern and unyielding, and to insist on Utah getting everything. But after a great deal of persuasion he was induced to concede a few things to others and to allow Utah to be contented with the largest and best awards. I am sure that this additional reliance on generosity on the part of Mr. Kiesel will be greatly appreciated by exhibitors from the states.

"But this magnanimity will be greatly exceeded when in the near future you hold your congress, as you certainly will, in the state where it was born. Then Utah, acting as your host, entering any of the contests, and with the same characteristic generosity California is now showing, allow the other states, her welcome guests, to take the awards."

"Ladies and gentlemen, in behalf of Utah I thank California in general and Sacramento in particular for this cordial reception. We shall carry away with us most pleasant memories of it. And for the people of Utah I cordially invite you to become their guests at an early session of your great congress."
