LOCAL BRIEFS.

Architect C. M. Neuhausen has gone to Helper to start the building there of the railroad Y. M. C. A.

Miss Zella Shimmitt, a Bell Telephone operator in this city, and J. Frank Plig of Hastings, Mich., were married in Ogden Saturday by Judge Howell.

D. S. Melness, representing the Southwestern Securities company, has been to the city, and is at the Kenyon, intending to establish a branch establishment in this city.

Charles M. Wardle, formerly of West Jordan, but now counselor to the Bishop of Parker, Idaho, is at the Kenyon, intending to establish a branch establishment in this city.

The Scandinavians of this city will celebrate their national holiday in the Salt Lake Theater, on the 15th inst. The exercises will be conducted in both English and Scandinavian.

Frank C. O'Kelly, the former hotel bell boy who married Mrs. Allan Campbell, formerly Mrs. Eleanor Young of this city, is at the Kenyon hotel looking after business interests of his wife here.

Meers, Skiffis and Stathakis of the Greek colony are arranging for a higher school where their countrymen in this city can be taught the English language and thus become better American citizens.

Prof. Rubin Goldmark, the Wagnerian lecturer, who is to lecture in Unity hall tomorrow evening, was to have arrived this afternoon, but has been delayed by a wreck, and will not reach this city until tomorrow. But he will be here in time for the lecture.

The annual meeting of the Utah Credit Men's association has been postponed until the evening of the 20th inst., when the business of the evening will be topped off with a banquet at the Commercial club. Plates will be placed for 75 members.

The drilling machinery for the Strawberry dam has arrived at Heber, and is now being hauled into the Strawberry country. The reservoir lake will cover 6,000 acres, or 10 square miles. Prof. Swendsen will leave early in the week for the valley to see the work formally started.

W. E. Gilbert, a veteran traveling man, and representing a bank note paper house in Los Angeles, is at the Kenyon. He says the impression in southern California is that the bulk of the eastern travel to the great southwest will come over the San Pedro road, and that the Southern Pacific and the Santa Fe will lose by the opening of the new line.

The contractors say the Utah building at the Portland exposition will be completed May 20, and Hon. Spencer Clawson is on the ground to see that the contract is carried out. The legend "Utah" is to appear in incandescents over the entrance to the structure. The building annex is ready for occupancy. All the state buildings will be ready by the 20th inst.

The raising of hot house roses is an industry which local florists say will repay investment, if it can be successfully conducted. One dealer claims to import 1,000 roses a week, and others claim business in similar proportion. The roses coming from Council Bluffs, Chicago, Denver, Boise and from California points, in council Bluffs, one grower has 10 acres of hot houses. Cultivators are successfully grown in Utah and great quantities are shipped out to adjoining states.

Wild horses are roaming over the southern Nevada deserts in large bands, and making a nuisance of themselves by the damage they do to ranches and in stampeding domestic stock. Consequently the ranchmen have sworn extermination, and are killing the wild horses whenever they can get the drop on them. But the springs over the country are being taken up and fenced in, so that wild horses are kept in the cut off, the wild horse will soon become a relic of the past.

THE RESURRECTION.

Subject Discussed Yesterday by Bishop Nichols of California.

Bishop Nichols of California preached at St. Mark's cathedral yesterday morning, from two texts in John, indicating the two different kinds of resurrection. His first text from John, 11: 44, read: "And he that was dead came forth bound hand and foot with grave clothes, and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto him, and let him go." This passage, indicated the character of the resurrection of Lazarus, while the complete and final resurrection of Jesus Christ was expressed in John, 20: 6-7: "Then cometh Simon Peter following him and went into the sepulcher and sought the linen clothes, he, and the napkin that was about his head not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together by itself."

TOP NOTCH FOR WOOL.

Wyoming Clip of 85,000 Pounds Brings 22 3/4 Cents.

Special Correspondence. Rawlins, Wyo., May 8.—Wyoming wool has reached the highest price ever attained since the inauguration of the industry in this state 30 years ago. Andy Nelson & Co. were the lucky flockmasters, receiving 22 3/4 cents per pound for 85,000 pounds of Francis, Bailey & Co. of Boston were the purchasers. The wool is very fine.

Wool has been selling here for from 19 to 22 cents for a week, and it is predicted the high water mark will not be reached until 24 and 25 cents are offered. It is reported that one flockmaster received 25 cents for his wool, but the report cannot be confirmed.

WOOL MARKET ACTIVE.

Good Prices and Heavy Clips Keep Interest Extreme Y. Keen.

The wool market continues active at good prices. Most of the buying is now going on in Montana, which, outside of Oregon, is practically the only state where any wool remain unsold. It is estimated that 75 per cent of the clip of Montana has already been sold. Prices range from 21 to 24 cents. In Utah, Nevada, Idaho and Wyoming the new wools are practically all sold, only a few straggly clips remain to be cleaned up. Contracting is still going on in Oregon, the ruling prices being 18 and 20 cents. It is probable that all the wools that can be secured in Oregon before sales days will be taken by the eastern buyers who have been operating in the Utah field during the past few weeks.

Shipping in full progress now in California, the wools being practically all sold. Prices have ruled very high there as in other sections of the far west.

TWO STORES TAPPED.

Thieves Break In and Steal Some Time During the Night.

The California Fruit store, and the Excelsior kitchen on Richards street, were burglarized last night, but nothing of any great value was stolen. From the candy store the thieves secured about 15 pounds of candy, and a small quantity of fruit from the other place. Entrances to both places was obtained by breaking windows and unhooking the doors. The police were notified and are working on the cases.

LEW WALLACE'S GIFT.

Following a wish expressed by Gen. Lew Wallace just before his death that his country be known as Waterbury, he has left a gift of \$25,000 as a gift if it could be arranged to establish a fish hatchery upon it, his son and widow have tendered the place to the government and asked that it be accepted and the fish hatchery established.

The farm consists of about 65 acres of the finest land in Montgomery county, Ohio, and is situated on the banks of the river. It was the favorite summer resort of the general, and it was there that he did a great deal of literary work. There are about 100 acres of timber on the farm, and the owner was engaged in breeding trout and bass at the time of his death. Two years ago a keeper's house was erected on the farm, and cost \$2,000. There is also another house, which Gen. Wallace occupied every summer. An effort has been made for several years to secure the fish hatchery for Indiana, and Gen. Wallace had this in mind when he suggested that the farm be presented to the government.
