WEBER STAKE CONFERENCE.

Interesting Addresses by President Joseph F. Smith and Others.

FUNERAL OF MRS. BEARDSLEY.

Walde Wilcoxson Meets Painful Ac-
cident—Shakespearian Evening—
Briefs and Personals.

The quarterly conference of the Weber Stake was held in the Ogden tabernacle, Jan. 16, 1904. President L. W. Shurtliff presiding. The morning session was commenced at 10 o'clock. After the opening devotional exercises President C. P. Middleton and Elder William M. Moves of the High Council made brief addresses and bore faithful testimony to the truthfulness of "Mormons."

John L. Herrick, superintendent of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement of the stake, reported that organization in fine condition. He suggested the need among the young people of the observance of better order, decorum and reverence for houses of worship.

 Elder Rudger Clawson of the Apo-
stles addressed the Saints. He called attention to the forces of destruction which in the year past had ex-
ceeded previous record in the world.These conditions reminded the speaker of certain passages which he read from the Doctrine and Covenants, section 115. He spoke of the compara-
tive safety enjoyed by those living in Zion and especially those who are living in their religion. The signs of the times are the fulfillment of prophecy. The speaker said that the world was in a state of sin getting out of debt, to maintain its annual honor and credit, and to keep the promises made and to be careful to make no promises they cannot keep. When borrowing money, look upon your promise to pay it as soon as you can be sure and meet the obligation when it comes due. Should conditions have arisen whereby one is unable to pay, he should meet the party to whom he is indebted and make it good some way so that his honor and credit may be kept intact. To do otherwise is a sin before God. We should avoid going in debt as much as possible, but when it is impos-
sible to meet the obligation at the proper time. Elder George A. Smith of the quorum of Apostles complimented the officers of the stake as energetic and wide-
awake and efficient. The priesthood regulations were commended and called to those of any other stake in Zion but held that there is much room for improvement. We are here on earth, said the speaker, not by accident but to ful-
fill a mission, and accomplished that mission will have a bearing on our salvation in the world to come. He urged the Saints to watch their children, and to train them in the ways of the Lord, that they may walk in His path and advance in usefulness and goodness as they advance in years. He also dwelt briefly on the power of others.

The choir sang, "Prayer is the soul's

shock desire," and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop E. T. Woolley.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon services were com-
menced at 2 o'clock by the choir sing-
ing, "We thank Thee O God for a pro-
phet," by Patriarch Santos. Elder John Henry Smith, of the gospel is to be preached in all the world as a witness against all men; and it be-
comes the duty of those having accept-
ed the gospel to do all in their power to extend a kind word to all the world to all of our Father's children. The Gos-
pel is to prepare mankind to associate in the eternal world with the just and perfect. Few, if any, thought, fully real-
ized the great importance of our mis-
sions. They appreciated the cove-
nants and privileges given to us by the church. It is remarkable to examine the lives of some to find that they are content to have their names entered on the records of the church and their last resting place. We are to be judged on the books, but the speaker feared that many will disregard that the books that would contain the record of good things done will be blotted out as far as our labors in connection with the work of the Lord is concerned. We find that many of our brethren will spend two or more years in preaching the gospel, and a few weeks after their return they will forget their duties as to even forget to give a contribution to another ward to take a recommendation with them. It is discovered quite frequently when our Saints die that they do not belong to any ward and hence we hardly know where to hold the ser-
vice.
