Races Tonight Attract Much Notice On Account of Challenge Event For Honors in Plugging.

Tonight at the Salt alace saucer track there is a rather important race scheduled, that is from the standpoint of the two riders who take place in it. The race is the result of a feeling in the heart of each rider that he can win at a game that is distinctly Samuelson's and not Lawson's. The challenging party is Sam-uelson, who was stung to this stand, which is in the nature of a last ditch position, by the fact that lver beat him a week ago tonightat exactly the same kind of a game. The only GXcuse available then, except the one that Sammy belong ed back to the potato patch, was the one that Lawson Arted right on his rear wheel and rode him down before he had a chance to make a light for position. Samuelson, loser of many battles, tack-ed to the excuse, and declared Lawson rould not beat him if they started across the saucer from each other. Nobody thought Lawson could. Lawson was known as king of sprinters, Sammy as king of pluggers. But within the week, Lawson had stripped Sammy of all bonors in the sprint line, and crowded him away back into his lair of pluggery, trimming him well in the middle distance events in the sprint line. At first Sammy had the ear of the crowd, and his wall was listened to intently. Then came a day when the crowd saw that he was less dis-posed to run a fair race, and fight to the death than was his accused opponent, and public sympathy experienced a shift of laws. of a game. Now people are willing to bet on Law-son, and not on Sammy, even in an event of this kind, which a month age would have been considered Sammy's without the running. Much depends on the out-come for Sammy. It can hardly be called disastrous for him to lose, as he has al-ready suffered disaster to a full capacity. but to lose will abolish for him the one-remaining game at which he can be rated a first class rider. To win will leave him a fair remnant of a once glorious career, and give him a fighting chance "to come back" to his old-time form, and do what never has yet been done, have a second career after starting down the sidefrack. For Lawson the outcome is guite dif-ferent. He is already first in speed, and first in the hearts of the bleacher crowd. He has whilped his opponent on a fair field, crowded the battle into his territory and beaten him, and now has pushed him to his last corner and pro-poses to fight him there, giving pust a flavor of bearding the lion in his den to the encounter. A winning for Lawson means all the glory of an unequal battle to a hero who already flas as much glory as it is meet for one man to carry on bis shouldes. If he loses they will ap-plaud him anybow from the bleachers for daring the encounter, and they will know from his past record that he will ride himself all in to make the fight game, while from Sammy's past performances they will expect him to fig a milk white flag as soon as the whir of Lawson's wheel is heard in his rear, or he looks back to see Lawson coming out to chal-lenge him for a final sprint. The races tonight echo back that old battle that has made the world move on-the fight of the strong against the weak, the struggle for mastery among men, and the final survival of the most fit to stay in the same, It's a race in which the purse is not the chief consideration.
