### HEARD IN DISTRICT COURT

When Months for Burglary—Eighteen Months as Accessory in Elopement Episode.

When County Business—Found Dead in His Room—No Council Meeting, No Quorum.

In the second district court, before Judge Blapp, the following matters were heard:

J. C. Robinson was sentenced to fifteen months imprisonment in the State penitentiary for burglarizing the R. G. W. dining car on August 20th, 1899.

John Albert Livingston was sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment, having pleaded guilty to being an accomplice in the late Howarth adultery case.

Matthew Crawford was given until Wednesday to plead to the charge of burglarizing the case of Sidney Stevens vs. S. C. and W. J. Stephens, the demurrer was overruled and ten days given to answer.

Frank Thompson vs. James Montgomery et al. The motion to tax costs was granted on the advice of the court.

In the case of M. C. Brough vs. Eliza Warren et al. The costs were taxed.

Albert Swingsworth was admitted to citizenship.

W. C. Wilson vs. Union Light and Power company et al. Action was dismissed as to the Central Trust company and the Industrial Trust company. Demurrer in this case was taken.

TEACHERS TO RECEIVE FULL PAY.

The subject of compensation for the teachers during their enforced vacation has been a matter of controversy between them and the trustees. The trustees at first were willing to accept half pay, but the school board declined to pay that or any other amount. The matter was referred to the State superintendent of public instruction, Dr. H. C. Parker, who has now referred the matter to the attorney general's office. In the mean time the school board referred the matter to the attorney general's office, inclosing a copy of the contracts entered into by the trustees and teachers. About two weeks ago the attorney general handed down an opinion fortified by legal precedents, establishing the legal right and justice of the teachers receiving full salary. However, the trustees refused to concede with the opinion of that eminent authority, but proposed to the teachers to submit the matter in dispute to the Hon. John E. Booth of Provo, his decision to be final, and both parties to agree to it. With hesitation the teachers agreed and were, indeed, proud to think that the trustees had selected so able a jurist. The matter was submitted. The decision came in harmony with the majority of the trustees, and subject, and with the decisions of States' supreme courts in cases analogous to the one in dispute. His honor decided that the teachers are entitled to full compensation.

The structure is neat, tasty and commodious, and reflects much credit on Bishop Gardner and the members of his ward for the willing energy and public spirit displayed.

"SMALLPOX" ABATING.

A normal condition of business in general is re-asserting itself after many weeks of a partial paralysis of trade, because of the presence of imported varioloid, chickenpox, smallpox, or whatever the contagion is. That it is a contagion there is no doubt, as it has been traced to the same source. Indeed, recently, cases of chickenpox and measles have been the direct cause of the spreading of the disease into some families.

SCHOOLS REOPENED.

The public schools re-opened last Monday, after a forced vacation of the old

settlers who had struggled so hard for an existence in the early days. Some, it was related, had to be rescued by substituting upon, and built mud walls around their cabins to protect themselves from Indians, cutting willows to feed their cattle; many were without sufficient clothing to keep them warm, having to make shirts out of old wagon covers, etc. No wonder they feel proud of the comfortable brick and frame houses they now occupy.

A Bonanza in Artesian Wells—Interesting News Notes.

Franklin, Oneida Co., Idaho, Feb. 5.—Messrs. George Sant and William Lowe, a few days ago commenced boring for artesian wells, and have met with success. A good flow of water was obtained for Hoot Brothers, and also for the Parkinson Brothers, but the best well thus far is one that was bored by Mr. Samuel C. Parkinson. They went down about ninety feet obtaining a flow of forty gallons to the minute, up ten feet from the top of the ground and sixty gallons two feet above ground. The well drivers say it is the most flow they ever struck, and they have put down many wells in Utah and Idaho. They are now putting one down for Mr. E. C. Parkinson. The prospect is that a good many will be put in Franklin, and we are in hope that we will have one or more in the cemetery. They use for the wells two-inch iron pipe.

And in these days of disbelief I thought his narrative would be of interest to the sisters, hence, I am sending it to the Semi-Weekly "News."

Mrs. Howells said: "I was blind for 22 years, and a little over three years ago my eyes became very painful, so much so that the pain was almost insupportable. One night I dreamed the following: I heard a rap at our door. I thought I answered the door, and found a lady enveloped in a dark cloak, who said to me, 'You have had trouble with your eyes, have you not?' 'Yes,' I replied. 'The lady then said, 'If you will bathe your eyes with warm mustard and water your sight will then be restored.' I replied, 'I cannot stand that.' 'Very well,' the lady answered, 'then take catnip and corn meal and make a poultice,' and then she went away. Three years ago this New Year's day, I applied the catnip and corn meal, and a few days after my sight was fully restored, and is good now. I can read the Deseret News as well as any lady of my age, as far as eye sight is concerned."

After her eyes were opened on meeting old friends that she had known only by hearsay, she loudly exclaimed, "Oh, now I can see you," and was and is truly happy.
