Love's Old Sweet Song as Fiddled by

Bugs in Dying Days of Summer.

When summer begins to wane-say

When summer begins to wane-say along about the middle of September-and all the little bugs of the treetops and grasses are preparing to vanish with the bolidays, just attune wour ear to mature's orchestra, and you will hear a mighty fiddling. From grand-father bug to baby bug the entire fam-lity have out heir fiddles and hows, and are sending forth Love's Old Sweet Song and hullables and farewells which are just as tuneful as the airs pro-duced by a human orchestra. There is scarcely an losset of the fiddle and how, and, by means of their violin strings, certain loser's call upop their mates, give signals, communicate

violin strings, certain insects call upon their mates, give signals, communicate intelligence and, perhaps, give expres-sion to their own little emotions. They do not confine themselves to one tune. In the daytime their trill is full of spirit and joy; at night if takes on a tinge of melancholy and somber-ness. Even their songs change from sprightliness to one of sorrow. Upon the tunes produced by the lit-tle musicians depends the domestic happiness of the insects. The male alone fiddles, and if his love tune be true his chance of winning a noiseless bride are much better.
