

FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.

Rougemont de Lowenberg & Co., bankers in Paris, have suspended payment, with liabilities amounting to from five to six hundred thousand pounds sterling.

THE DANO-GERMAN QUESTION.

The final vote in the Danish Lower House, on the treaty of peace, was taken on the 9th inst., the treaty was approved by seventy-five to twenty-one votes. One member abstained from voting. Four were absent. All the deputies present from Schleswig and the Euclaves, ceded by the treaty to Germany, voted against the treaty. The bill was afterward sent to the Upper House.

JAPAN.

The details of the naval operations against Japan by the combined powers are published. The expedition was entirely successful. Henceforward there is to be a free passage to the inland sea, and all ships passing through the Straits of Shimonoseki are to be treated in the most friendly manner. The forts which were to a great extent, destroyed or rendered useless are not to be repaired, nor are any guns to be mounted on there, and no new forts are to be built. The Prince of Nagato is to defray the expenses of the expedition, and to pay a ransom on account of the town of Shimonoseki having been spared. The total loss of the expedition was about ninety killed and wounded, of which sixty-five fell to the English.

INDIA

Bombay letters of the 14th, and Calcutta of the 4th of October, fully confirm the disastrous effects of the great cyclone. Fuller accounts from Calcutta are expected in a few days.

CHINA.

A large meeting has been held in Hongkong, for the purpose of considering whether steps should be taken in reference to the demand which had been made upon the Colony by her Majesty's Government for an annual contribution of £20,000 toward the support of the troops on that station.

The farewell benefit of the Thorne theatrical troupe took place on the 18th of August. It was given under the patronage of his Excellency the Governor.

The weather had been very severe off the coast, and many marine disasters are reported.

The *Press* gives interesting details of the two retainers of the Prince of Nagato, who lately arrived at Yokohama from England, and were sent in her Majesty's steamers Barossa and Carmarant to the Straights of Simonosaki, in the hopes of establishing negotiations with their impracticable Chief.

The American steamer Chekiang, belonging to the Shanghai Steam Navigation Company, has been totally destroyed by fire at Hankow; the Far East was only saved from a similar fate by being built of iron, as the burning vessel was alongside of her.

On August 14th the steamer Soochow went ashore in Owen Bay. The Undine was immediately dispatched to Amoy. The vessel proved to be a wreck. Large parties of Chinamen came down from the interior and completely stripped the vessel of valuables.

The country around Swatow was completely inundated by late rains.

Highway robberies are frequent in Hongkong and its environs. Numerous deaths by cholera are reported.

News had arrived at Ningpo that the Imperialists and Franco-Chinese have experienced a defeat at Hoochow, by which five or six officers have been killed, and more than fifty wounded. M. D'Aigenibelle has in consequence come to Shanghai to ask advice from the French military authorities.

The Concerts of the Christy Minstrels were highly popular with the Hongkongites.

LATER FROM CHINA AND JAPAN.

News from Japan, per Edith Rose, represents trade as improving rapidly. The palace of Prince Choshill, at Pekin, has been leveled to the ground, and he has been degraded from all rank for his attacks on foreigners.

The Prince of Nagato has entered into engagements with the Admiral Commanding-in-Chief to pay all indemnities as they should be filed by the foreign representatives for past outrages in Foreign flags, all the expenses of the expedition and ransom for Simonseki, the Prince, to solicit time and indulgence for the amount and payment of these indemnities.

No political importance is attached to the attack upon the Dutch Consulate General at Jeddo, as it appears to have been the result of a mere drunken frolic among the Japanese soldiers.
