Whereas, Ogden City has given writ-ten notice of intention in the above entitled case to apply for the appointment of a receiver of said water sys. tem, said receiver to collect and hold all water rentals until said case and all

NEWTON. PREST. WILLIAM F. RIGBY.

Impressive Funeral Services - Close of a Brilliant Career.

Special Correspondence.

Newton, Cache Co., March 19 .-- The funeral services over the remains of the late President Wm. F. Rigby, of the Fremont Stake, whose death was an-nounced in the "News" last week, took place in Newton meeting house on Sat-urday, March 16th. The services were attended by a large number of friends and relatives from various parts of Utah and Idaho. Appropriate remarks were made by President Thomas E. Ricks of the Fremont Stake, Idaho, to whom Brother Rigby has acted as first whom Brother Rigoy has acted as first counsellor since the colonization of southern Idaho by the "Mormon" peo-ple: Brother Robert L. Fishburn of Brigham City, Bishop John Jardine of Clarkston, President Samuel Roskelley. Elder Amos Clarke and Bishop Wm. H. Griffin of Newton, All of the membras Griffin of Newton. All of the speakers bore testimony to the excellent character borne by the deceased, and to his indefatigable labors in the Church and as a ploneer. He was a wise counselor, a true friend, a loving husband and a true friend, a loving husband and father. William Roskelly of Smithfield sang a beautiful solo. Forty-two carriages followed the remains to the cemetery, where they were laid to rest among the remains of the large number of his family who have preceded him to the other. other side. Brother Rigby leaves a large family who keenly feel the ablarge family who keenly feel the ab-sence of their loving father and hus-band. The family has the heartfelt sympathy of the people of Newton, where Brother Rigby was Bishop for a number of years and in that capacity gained their love and esteem. William Frederick Rigby Sr. was born at Saddlesworth, Yorkshire, England, on January 29th, 1833. In July, 1848 he hecame identified with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. In 1852 he married Miss Mary Clarke, and in April, 1893. Bother Rigby and wife in April, 1893, Brother Rigby and wife bid goodby to their native land, and bid goodby to their native land, and with a company of Saints took passage in the ship Camilius and started on their journey to Zion. Many were the trials and hardships they had to en-dure before they reached their destina-tion. Brother Rigby was one of ten volunteers who were sent to Sait Lake City ahead of the company with letters to President Young requesting aid for the emigrants whose teams were exhausted, as was whose teams were exhausted, as was also their supplies. These volunteers aralso their supplies. These volunteers ar-rived at President Young's office on October 5th, 1853, having walked 179 miles in five days. He remained in Salt Lake City the following eighteen months. In the spring of 1855, he re-moved to Lehl, where he resided for several years. In the spring of 1861 he went to Cache Valley and there made his permanent home and consequently. his permanent home, and consequently was one of the ploneer farmers of that county. In Nov., 1866, President Rigby was set apart as one of the presidents was set apart as one of the presidents of the Sixty-fourth quorum of Seventy. Was called as Bishop of Clarkston in Sept., 1867: remained in Clarkston only three years, when in Nov., 1870, he was chosen as Bishop of Newton, which position he occupied until the spring of 1884, when he was called as first coun-selor to President Thomas E. Ricks, of the Bannock Stake, Idaho, (now Fre-

mont Stake) which position he occupied at the time of his death, which occurred at Logan on Wednesday, March 13th, 1901, after a long illness, during which he suffered greatly. Elder Rigby filled a mission to England a few years ago. Also served one term as a member of

the Idaho Legislature. He was indeed one of the foremost colonizers among the "Mormon" peo-

colonizers among the "Mormon" peo-ple, and was particularly efficient in building up the Idaho colonies. President Rigby was a firm and prac-tical believer in all the doctrines of the Gospel as taught by the Latter-day Saints; by his cheerful and genial dis-position he gained friends among all classes of people, and his memory will be fondly cherished by all who knew him. ılm.

NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

Arrangements are now under way for the formation of a telephone company by a number of our business men, which, when completed, and a fran-chise granted, will put in a local exchange, using a new system patented by one of our fellow townsmen. This new system is destined to revolutionize the construction of telephone exchange. The inventor calls his sys-tem the "circuit segregating and cut-out telephone system," By this sys-tem the central office will be done away with. As many as twenty patrons can use one set of wires (4) with absolute privacy. They can connect and dis-connect without the aid of a central office, and be absolutely free from eaves-droppers. The cost of maintaining will not be more than \$1.50 per month to the patrons. The inventor has erected an experiment system from his residence to several business houses, and has demonstrated all that he

orior to the annual election, and it be-ing now practically impossible to give the thirty days' notice before our next annual village election, therefore be it "Resolved. That the action of this board of March 4th, 1901, bearing on the question of the village being a city of the second class, be, and the same is hereby rescinded." So, it seems, we must be content with our present form of village government for a year longer, but this will in no wise retard our development and pros-perity.
