

## YOUNG CORBETT HAS PUNCH YET

Knocks Out Hughey Murphy in Six  
Rounds at Boston.

## BIG CROWD SAW CONTEST.

Champion Floored His Man Twice in  
The First Round—Murphy Made  
Good Showing.

Boston, June 25.—Young Corbett of Denver knocked out Hughey Murphy of New York in six rounds at catch weights here tonight. The contest was witnessed by upward of 3,500 people. Corbett nearly finished his man in the first round, flooring him twice in quick succession. The Denver boy's inside fighting was superb, and he slashed with both hands with telling effect. In the fifth round only did Murphy out-point Corbett, and then he made things look a little doubtful. Round 1—The men opened cautiously. 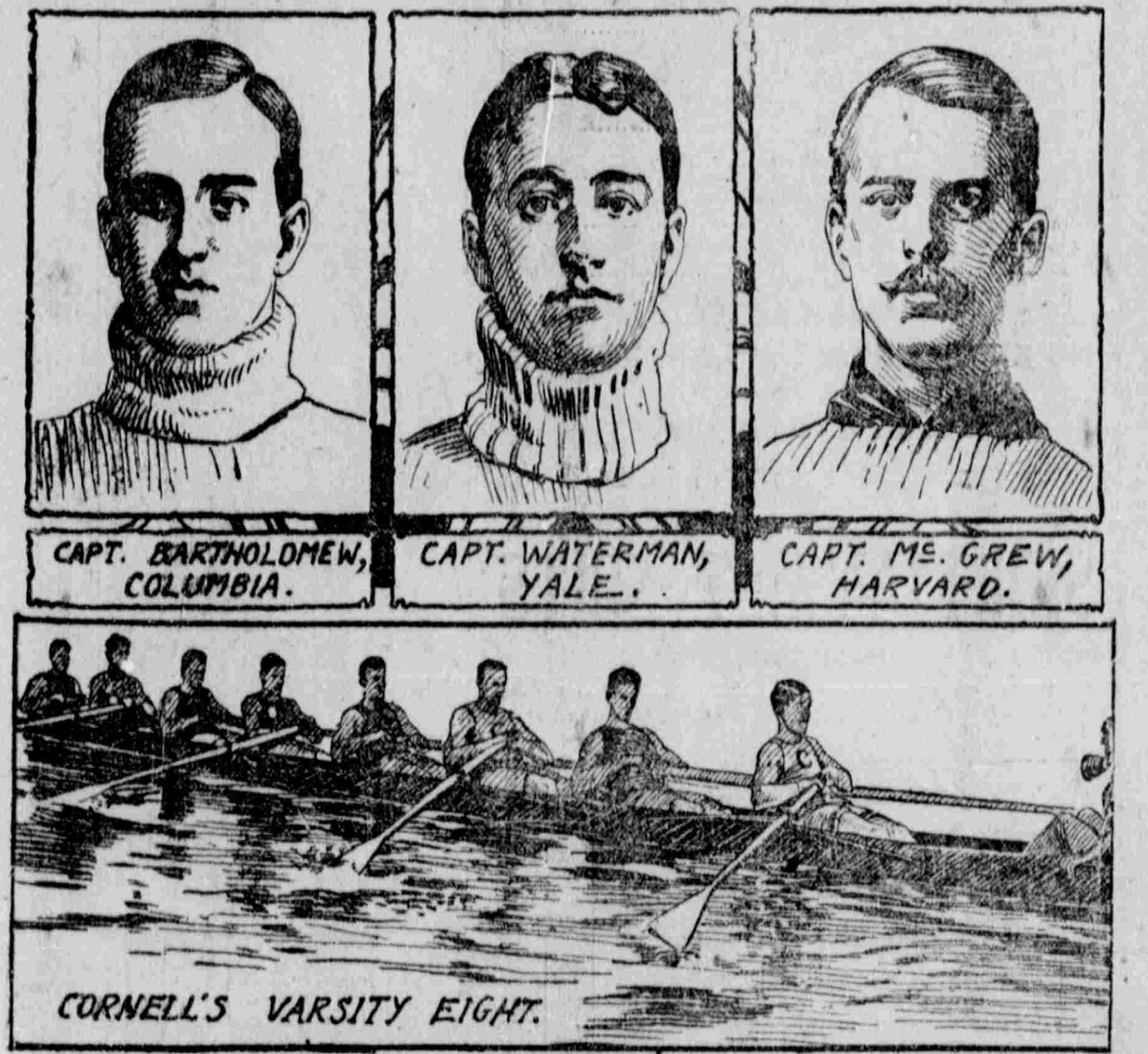

Round 5—Corbett rushed at Murphy who stopped a left jab aimed at his nose. Murphy did considerable dodging and Corbett seemed anxious, as he had from the outset, to wind up the battle. Corbett sent the left and right to Murphy's body and left side of the head. Murphy flung four times in return, but his blows had little ginger.

Round 6—This round lasted but about one minute. Corbett used both hands as in previous rounds and knocked his man out with a terrific right on the jaw.

**WHAT "PITTSBURGH PHIL" SAYS**

He Says a Mean Advantage Has Been Taken.  
New York, June 24.—George E. Smith, known among turf men everywhere as "Pittsburgh Phil," the entry of whose horses has been ordered to be refused by the Jockey club stewards, says in regard to the affair:

"I am so surprised that I hardly know what to say. It is not that this blow has fallen unexpectedly but I feel that a mean advantage has been taken. I was at Sheephead Bay for the pur-

posed. This is a disgrace to me which I shall not accept in any meek manner. Two of the men who have passed judgment upon me are my personal enemies.

"I have threatened to injure me and I have expected that they would take the first opportunity to do what they have done, but I cannot understand what excuse they have for putting a ban upon my horses. I have a small stable, and my horses have been consistent performers this year. I have started them thirteen times and I have won nine races. Twice one of my horses was beaten as you may say by a nose, landing in second place. Once one of my horses ran third and once Grand Opera, after winning four races, finished worse than third. The going was muddy and he could not do himself justice. I would like to have some one show me another stable that has been as consistent.

"I have been racing for 21 or 22 years and I defy any person to show where I have done anything wrong. I will give \$50,000 to any person who will show that I ever attempted to cheat in any manner. That offer is broad and I will make it good.

"My honor is at stake. I am willing to spend my money to clear myself. I will take this matter to the highest court I can reach.

"I was told last year that I was betting too much money. The same message was given to others. I sent back word that I was ready to quit. And I did quit as a plunger. My wagers this year have been small compared with those of former years. I have not bet as much in five days as I bet on a single race last year.

"I have been criticized for winning. When I have lost, nothing has been said."
