Stung by a Scorpion.

Walter Willis, of Paradise, was brought to Logan on Saturday, suffering from the effects of a scorpion's sting, received while turning over a rock at the mouth of Paradise canyon. The poisonous insect stung the victim between the thumb and little finger of one of Mr. Willis' hands, so firmly that it took quite a pull to detach it. It is described for an epinephrine of the sting having been fully three inches in length. Mr. Willis' hand and arm were swollen and he was suffering from a great deal of pain. He was taken to the hospital and the poison was treated by the physician and the condition was quite

dangerous. Dr. Ormsby cut the hand and removed the sting and gave the patient quantities of liquor. In spite of the treatment Willis' pain continued falling and the heart's action became feeble, the arm swelled in proportion to the pain and the veins stood out in ridges. A rash also broke out on his face. Hypodermic injections of anesthetic were resorted to, and the symptoms became less alarming. He was not entirely out of danger when he died, but his attention was supplied with stimulants and full directions for his care.
