FARMINGTON.

Simon Bamberger Wants Share of Irrigating Waters.

Farmington, Davis Co., May 2.—Si-mon Bamberger in his suit aginst the North Cottonwood Irrigation and Wat-er company, of Farmington, brought to restrain the defendant company from preventing the plaintiff diverting certain water (alleged to be surplus water) for use in Lagoon, was non-sulted by Judge Rolapp on April 26th, and today his agent posted notices of appropriation of certain waters flowing from the same canyon. Owing to abnormal weather conditions, the presence of insect enemies, the failure of the seed, and other influences, it often becomes necessary to estpone the planting of corn or to replant the corn. The question which presents itself under such conditions is how the date of planting affects the yield and maturity. Many of the experiment stations have carried on ex-periments for several years to deternine the influence of the time of planting corn on the yield and maturity of the crop, which have thrown much light

on this subject.

In experiments at the Indiana station it was found that the earliest planting (May 1) yielded the largest crop (41 bushels per acre), while the latest planting yielded about one-fourth less (31.7 bushels per acre). The time required for the crop to mature decreased as the time of planting was delayed. A delay of thirty or forty days in planting shortened the time required for the corn to mature from two to three weeks, At the Kansas station the average re-sults of experiments in this line carried on for two years showed that corn planted in the beginning of May gave the best results, and at the Illinois station the average results of similar ex-periments were in favor of the planting made from May 4 to 18, with tendencies slightly favoring the later dates.

The experiments indicate, therefore, that under favorable conditions there is an advantage in early planting; but in view of the uncertainties of the weather, which is always a controlling factor in the growing of crops, these results must be applied with caution in

Planting should not begin too early in the season. "Nothing is gained by put-ting seed into soil which is too cold ar too wet to favor germination. It is bet-ter to defer the planting a week or ten days than to run the risk of losing it by decay or of having an imperfect stand by planting before the ground is sufficiently dry to work well and warm enough for immediate growth.
