## SCORES OF PEOPLE SERIOUSLY INJURED.

Chicago, Sept. 4 .- More than a score of people were hurt, several seriously, in a wreck on the Milwaukee Avenue cable train here early today. The train composed of a grip tand two other cars was bringing a heavy load of working people down town, when between Gir-ard street and Evergreen avenue, the grip struck a raised plate in the track. The middle car plunged into the grin The middle car plunged into the grip and the trailer crashed into it. Men, women and children were piled into confused masses. A panic followed. All available patrol wagone in the district were sent to the scene to extricate the passengers from the wreckage. Many of the injured were pinned in until the wreckage was chopped or sawed away.
