"Them Eggs."

SALT LAKE CITY,

Editor Deseret News:

Great consternation has unquestionably resulted from the discovery, by a city contemporary, of a piece of bark three-fourths of an inch in diameter containing, from exact mathematical calculation (whether by differential or integral calculus doth not appear) 17,000,000 moths' eggs, of hues red, white and blue (truly loyal moths).

MYTH, NOT MOTH.

Now, lest this consternation should result in greater calamity, (only two suicides having as yet resulted therefrom) I beseech you, inform the public that no such moral, physical, vegetable, animal or mineral prodigy exists as the eggs of a moth.
