use smoke of magnesium by burning some magnesium wire inside it, a very long time clapses before the magnesia scilles out and leaves the glass clear of smoke. But if a metallic point be introduced into the jar, connected by a wire to one of the poles of a good trictional or induction electric machine, it is only necessary to set the machine to work, and almost instantly an extraordinary effect is observed in-

side the bell jar. The magnesia smoke commences to whirl about and then forms itself into arge flakes and strings which rapidly ettle on the bottom and sides, leaving the jar perfectly clean of smoke. Wha would have taken several hours to set le in the orlinary course is completel tienned and deposited in a few seconds The same effect is produced if the jar is filled with any kind of smoke, that from thick paper or from a cigar, be ing acted upon exactly in the same manner as the magnesia. Prof. Lodge told his andience that he and his assistant had made experiments

Left to itself, it took many hours to deposit. But as soon as the electric machine was set to work, the same action took place as with the magnesia in the bell jar. hamber, which was as clear as before ne fume was let into it. Further experiments were then tried as to the action of the electric dis-charge upon the fume in rapid motion. No effect could be seen through the windows, because the rapid current swept the fume onwards too fast to allow any change being observed at that point.
