Greatest Game of Football Played in Los Angeles.

CREDIT DUE THE LOGANITES.

Visiting Eleven Puts Up Stubborn Defense Against Their Classier Opponents-Brassard Crippled

(Los Angeles Times.) Vincent's, 11; Utah Agricultural St.

College, 0. In the greatest game of football played in the south for several years, st. Vincent's scored a spiendid victory over the Utah "Aggles" yesterday art-

over the Utah "Aggies yesterday arte-ernoon at Fiesta park, The Saints, by their gilt-edged play throughout the match, carned the dis-tinction of being the best football-team ever organized in southern Cali-fornia. The visitors were on the de-fense continually, and the home team had the upper hand at all stages of

fense continuity, hand at all stages of the game. Eugene Shute made his first ap-pearance with St. Vincent's as full-back and played a great game. On the detense he played in the back-field with Tortes, and the pair han-dled punts with rare ability and ran them back for big gains. Shute was amazingly fast and made geveral sensational runs. He was knocked out early in the game, and suffered during the entire contest with hemorrhage of the nose, but he was gestra the star player of the day, his spectacular runs contributing targely to the showing made by his team. The Saints were much stronger than in the game with the Colorado Miners as a result of a different arrangement of the players. Forward passes and one-side kicks were executed with great effectiveness, and the team work of the eleven held together. The team was full of "pepper" and fighting spir-it, and the men followed the ball and helped each other in an invincible manner.

STUBBORN DEFENSE.

The Mormons put up a stubborn de-fense against their classier opponents, and contested every inch of the terri-tory which the Saints gained. The eleven was strong betwen the tackle positions, and the Saints were rarely able to make sensational gains through the line, but their ortensive play was weak against the St. Vincent's defense and they were thwarted in every man-ner of play they attempted. The Sants played the match with-out a substitution. Every man who started in the game was in his place when the final whistic blew, although the smashing game battered the team seriously. The "Aggles" failed to stand the gruelling as well, and Coach Walker used several extra men. Capt. Brassard was forced to leave the con-test on account of a twisted knee be-fore 10 minutes of the first half had elapsed, and he had to be assisted off the field.
