At the annual meeting, which was held at the office of the corporation April 23, the reports of the president and manager were read, showing that for the eight months preceding April 1 the builton production amounted to \$162, 274,99, while the total production since May 1 of last year way \$188,282,21 The

bullion production amounted to \$162. 274,99, while the total production since May 1 of last year was \$186,298,31. The average production was nearly \$17,000 per month, although for four months of this period the mill capacity was less than 20 tons a day, while recent ly it has been 19 tons. The null returns for the first 14 days in April, which were simply from the plates, aggregated \$17,000, indicating that the total cleanup for this month will be between \$45,000 and \$50,000, as against \$28,000 for March. The Round Mountain mine has al-ready paid for its entire equipment and development, and in addition has furnished \$74,000 with which to buy the Great Western property adjoining, which now belongs to the Round Mountain company. There are n. obligations of any kind resting against the company and there is a treasury surplus of \$17,551.70; and when the April and May net output is added, the treasury will contain about \$75,-000 available for dividends.
