Sleuths Have Been Watching the City Automobile and Report To Council.

### DOES HE WORK AFTER DARK

If Not, Why Does the City Pay for His Lamps?-That is One Question Among Many.

Aithough City Engineer Louis C. Kelsey rides around in a new automobile, it is doubtful whether the city will pay for it. After some discussion last night the city council placed the price of the machine, \$1,600, on the authorized list but Councilman Martin raised a legal objection and gave notice of reconsideration. Kelsey failed to ask for bids on automobiles and it is held that for this reason the purchase of the machine was made ille-

gally. From all appearances there are set-eral sleuths watching Kelsey like a cat does a mouse, When the bill was presented for payment last night, Councilman Holley declared that Kel-sey had paid too much for the machine. "I was offered the same machine for \$1,500" he exclaimed. I don't see why the city should be held up for \$100 when an individual can buy the same ma-chine for less money." Councilman Black hastened to the support of Kelsey. He stated that the engineer had purchased two head lamps and a speedometer which came to \$100 as extras. gally.

It is stated by the sleuths on his trail that he goes out Sundays with the machine. He also takes his blue to the baschell generation on the machine to the baseball games on the city's time as well, it is charged.

#### ANOTHER OBJECTION.

When City Engineer Kelsey sent in a communication asking for the ap-propriation of \$1,500 to install a weir in Parley's creek at Twelfth South street. Councilman Hall declared that price was too high.

This caused consid-erable debate and City Atty. H. J. Din-inny declared that he did not believe that the council had the right to re-quest the board of public works to take this action. Unless the contract is given to the lowest bidder it is held that all the bids must be rejected and new bids solicited. The matter was laid over a week to be discussed by the finance and municipal laws com-mittee to decide this point. In the meantime, he proposes to produce evidence that the plan to park Seventh East street was the work of designing officials. Mayor Bransford's veto of Council-man Holley's resolution for the lay-ing of two miles of sidewalks on Cen-ter street was approved. This was done, Councilman Black said, because the city found itself in financial dis-tress and was unable to do the work. SALARIES ON THE SHELF

The council authorized Chief Barlow The council authorized hier Barlow to purchase a motorcycle for Bicycle Pollceman Dan Grundvig. This will be used for burglar calls at night as well as chasing automobile speeders and violators of the bicycle ordinance.

Elijah Park was appointed as a special policeman for the Oregon Short Line in place of John Presser, whose appointment was revoked.

The report of the committee on the Oregon Short Line foot viaduct was approved. The difficulty was settled by removing the viaduct within about 10 feet of the north line of South Temple street. An entrance to the viaduct will be provided through the north wing of the new depot.
