## BREVITIES.

Jerusalem is to have a weekly newspaper.

In the United States there are 57,000 churches.

The new Boston postoffice is to cost \$1,872,000.

There are said to be 12,000 groggeries in the United States.

During the Fortieth Congress 3,180 bills were introduced.

Quebec is to have a velocipede masquerade. This is the latest.

The last Revolutionary pensioner has again died, at the age of 111.

All the negro regiments but two have been "consolidated" out of the United States army.

A Justice in the town of Phillips, Mo., recently fined a juvenile nine cents for being profane.

Anna Swan, the Nova Scotia giantess, is exhibiting her fair proportions at the London Crystal Palace.

A couple were recently married in Kansas City, Missouri, in less than one hour after being introduced.

Madame Olympe Adorad, who lately lectured in this country, has been arrested in Paris for seditious language.

An Australian author asserts that Napoleon the First had twenty-one illegitimate children, of whom five are still living.

There is a candidate for office in Covington, Ind., who copies names from tombstones in the churchyard to annex to his petition.

There are at present in operation in Maryland (exclusive of the City of Baltimore) 1,200 schools, conducted by 1,300 teachers, giving instructions to 70,000 children.

No less than fourteen railway locomotives have exploded within the past seven months in the United States, killing 29 persons outright, and severely wounding a much larger number.

Queen Victoria will, this year, visit Switzerland again, and make also a trip to Sicily and Greece. She will, however, keep away from Florence and Rome, and go by steamer from Genoa to Palermo.

The opinions on Senator Sprague's recent speeches and career in the Senate, are numerous and conflicting. He was the only Republican who voted against the bill which was passed in accordance with the message of the President providing for an election in Mississippi, Virginia and Texas. Some infer from this and other tendencies in the same direction, that he is going over to the Democratic party.

The current Australian papers announce the occurrence of extraordinary weather in some parts of the colony. At Wagga Wagga, at the close of December, flowers and shrubs were literally roasted and fruit trees burnt up. Plums approaching ripeness fermented under the powerful heat. The heads of many trees presented the appearance of having been subjected to the action of a steam of flames. Yet in the Tumut district, three days before, there was actually ice in the wash-basin basins of a morning. Wild horses were being destroyed in large numbers on the "Lovers country," near Wagga Wagga, where perishing from thirst. At Eabucua, on the 24th of December, bees were destroyed by the heat. Mr. John Shackelford found, on his return from Melbourne, that the contents of two of his largest and best hives had been totally destroyed by the melting of the combs and honey into one mass, by which the whole of the bees were smothered.

"Utah owns an artist in the person of George M. Ottinger, a Pennsylvanian by birth. Some of his pictures, 'Who Will Care for Mother Now?' a battle field incident, 'Independence Rock,' 'City Creek Falls,' etc., are noteworthy."

We find the above chip floating on the art news current, and agreed to see it, not more as a recognition of Mr. Ottinger's claims as an artist, than that the West is no longer a museum of oblivion to the talent that enters. Messrs Savage and Ottinger, of Salt Lake, are the fathers and patrons of art in the Great Interior West of this decade, and are as courteous gentlemen as ever thumbed an easel, sketched a landscape with a crayon, or pointed a camera, at a beauty spot of Nature. We think, however, Mr. Ottinger's best and most valuable work has never yet reached mention. It is a large oil painting, yet unfinished, and is a careful and accurate grouping of nearly an hundred different studies among the ancient ruins of America—Mexico, Arizona, California, and, if we recollect aright, of Central and South America. When complete it will present at a glance the tribute that an artist in many years of observation and toil brings to the treasury of subjects that no other modern pencil has limned, and furnishing knowledge of the ancient inhabitants of the Western coast. We believe Mr. Ottinger will yet so regard his "Ruins of America."—Montana Post.
