Thomas G. Webster Gone to an Honored Grave at 67.

Central, Graham Co., Ariz., Oct. 10,---The funeral services over the remains of Elder Thomas G. Webster, who died on the evening of the 18th inst. of pneu-monia, were conducted at the family residence this afternoon. The speakers were Presidents Andrew Kimball and William D. Johnson, Patriarch Samuel Clariage and Bishop Alva S. Porter, Choice selections were rendered by the Central choir, led by Elder George Coombs, and a quartet from the Thatcher choir, led by Prof. Frank Wightman of the Latter-day Saints' academy.
