Treasury Contains \$290,000 and Company Will Disburse Dividend In the Autumn.

A Nevada mine, one in which a good many Salt Lakers are interested as stockholders, that is making a splen did record is the Pittsburg Silver Peak. Since March 3, when the company placed a portion of its mill in operation, up to and including July 18, it has produced \$349,236.91.

According to Manager Director Effinger, who was in the city for a few hours yesterday en route to camp from the east, the present gross monthly production is approximately \$105,000, of which amount \$75,000 is profit. The mill is treating an average of 450 tons per day and, as the foregoing figures indicate, is giving highly gratifying results. Mr. Effinger says the company has in its treasury at the present time approximately \$200,000 and that the initial dividend will probably be disbursed some time during the coming autumn.

The Pittsburg Silver Peak company operates a line of railroad from a point on the main line of the Tonopah & Goldfield to Blair where the company's properties are located.


