Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 13 .- Tom Horn, the scout, Indian fighter and stock detective, was arrested at noon today by Sheriff Smalley and Deputy Proctor on a warrant charging him with the murder of Willie Nickel, the thirteen-year-
