## OBITUARY.

Died at Bountiful, Pavis County, Utah, June 111, 1281, after a lingering filhess of paralasis, Patriarch JOHN STOKER, aged 64 years, 3 months and 3 days. Deceased was born in Jackson County Ohio, where he resided till 1836, being a far mer by occupation. In the month of No vember, 1833, he became a member of the Church, being baptized by Elder Seymour Brunson, these on a mission to his native place. With his family, in the spring of 1836, he moved to Far West, Missouri, where he shared the trials and persecutions of the Saints in that State. In the spring of 1839 he noved to Adams County, Illinois, where he emained with the Church till 1842, thence he noved to Hancock County, Illinois, where he mained the four following years, moving with the Church in 1846 to the western part of the State of Iowa. In April, 1848, he left lowa for the mountains, being appointed by Elder Lorenzo Snow cuptain of 50 wagons, reaching Suit Lake City September 27th, same year; there be remained a few days, when he stated north for what is now known as Bountiful, where he settled with the four families then encamped there. Two years and three months later North Canon Ward of the Church was organized, of which he was ordained the bishop under the hands of Presients Young, Kimball and Rider J. M. Grant The following 23 years he acted as the Bishop of said Ward, remaining at home more or ess all the time save the fall and 'winter of 1849, when with Elder J. M.
