WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 30.18 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 58 degrees; maximum, 73; minimum, 57; mean, 65, which is 4 degrees above normal.

Excess of daily mean temperature since January 1, 2 degrees.

Precipitation since the first of the month, 39.4 inches, which is 1.58 inches below the normal.

Excess in precipitation since January 1, 2.75 inches.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the N. W. Ter., northern Rocky Mountain slope and Atlantic states; and lowest over the Pacific coast, Missouri valley and extreme northwest.

Precipitation occurred over portions of nearly all districts except the Ohio valley, lower lake region and eastern states. It was raining this morning at San Francisco, Little Rock, Kansas city, Calgary and Swift Current. The largest amount was 2.34 inches at San Francisco.

The temperature has fallen considerably over portions of the Rocky Mountain slope and plateau region, with a marked rise over portions of eastern Montana, North and South Dakota, Missouri and upper Mississippi valleys.

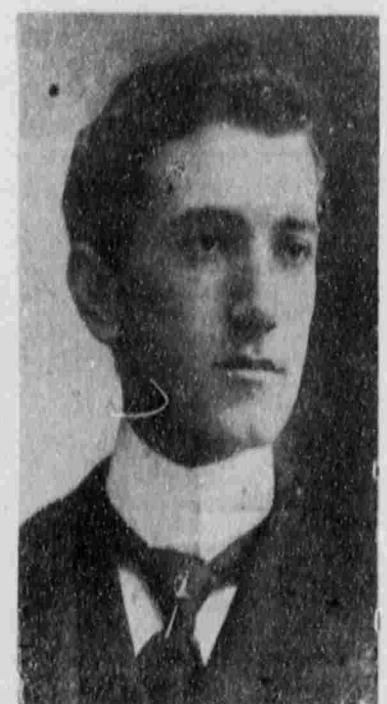
SALT LAKE BOY TO BE PROMOTED

Robert N Young Selected as Superintendent of Bradstreet's Office in This City.

BOGLE GOES TO LOS ANGELES.

Has Been Selected to Take Charge of The Office in City of the Angels.

A change in the position of superintendent of the local branch of Bradstreet's is announced to take place Monday. F. Bogle, Jr., who has had charge of the Salt Lake office since November last, leaves to assume charge of the Los Angeles office.

Since coming here from Bradstreet's Sacramento office, Mr. Bogle has materially increased the company's business, and it is in recognition of his good work that he has been chosen to take control of the Los Angeles branch. Robert N. Young, the new superintendent, is well known in Salt Lake. He has been connected with Bradstreet's for the past year and a half, and has received special training under Mr. Bogle that will result in the present methods and policies being continued without change. He came to Salt Lake fourteen years ago, and graduated in 1895 from the Lowell school. He then attended the high school for some time before branching out into business.

CAUGHT IN ELEVATOR.

Spencer Clawson and D. E. Burley Have Unique Experience.

The safety catches in the main elevator of the Deseret News building prevented a serious accident to Spencer Clawson and D. E. Burley this morning. While between the third and fourth floors of the building on an up trip, the elevator fuse burned out with a loud report, leaving the machine without control. Its safety catches, however, caught the elevator almost immediately, and held it fast. By standing on the operator's chair the two passengers, Mr. Clawson and Mr. Burley, were able to crawl out through the door into the fourth floor. The elevator will be repaired at once.

FAST FILLING UP.

L. D. S. University Has Heavy Registration This Year.

The sons of the Latter-day Saints' university presented an animated scene this morning when visited by a representative of this paper. Nearly every class room in the four-year courses was filled with students. A larger percentage of the students of last year have returned than ever before, and a larger proportion of new students is apparent also. Three registrars worked incessantly at issuing receipts in the four-year courses. About half of the business college students arrive during October and November, and by that time this department is expected to show a corresponding increase over the attendance of last season.

KILLED LITTLE BROTHER.

Small Boy Threw Rock With Fatal Result During Children's Quarrel.

Advice received from Iowa, Idaho, state that on Wednesday morning a boy named Jimmy Stanger was struck in the head and killed by a rock thrown during a quarrel, by his six year old brother. The children were playing together at the home of their parents, Joseph E. and Maggie Stanger, when some difficulty arose between them, and provoked the quarrel. Mr. and Mrs. Stanger were prostrated by the sad accident, and received the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.

INCORRIGIBLE BOYS.

Three Candidates for the Reform School Gathered In by Police.

Floyd Miles aged 13 years. David Ross, aged 12 years and Eddie Wells, aged 14, were arrested this morning by Officer Brown on the charge of incorrigibility. It is alleged that the youngsters refuse to attend school, and that their parents can do nothing with them. The police say that the boys have had a disgust at 334 west Fourth South street where they have been hiding, and where they have been concealing stolen goods. They will be arraigned before Judge Diehl tomorrow morning.
