 "If the relation be such that it is a matter of perfect indifference to the trust company whether the contractor makes or loses or what the outcome of his contract may be, then the owner-ship of stock in the company would not be a disqualification, for the reason that there would be no interest, direct or indirect, on the part of the stock-holders in the contract. Such would be the case if the trust company is abso-hately and beyond all question comlutely and beyond all question pletely indemnified against any loss by reason of its suretyship. "If, however, the relation between the trust company and the contractor

is such that the company is interested in the gain or loss of the contractor or in how much may be required to be ex-bended to perform the conditions of the contract, or if the relation is such that a question may arise as to whether or not there may be a liability on the part of the trust company not absolutely provided for, then, in my judgment, a stockholder of the company would have an indirect interest in the contract such as would disqualify him from membership on the board of public works.

The question is wholly one of fact to be determined by the circumstance) of each particular case, the true test in each instance being whether the inter-est of the stockholder is antagonistic to that of the city.

Inasmuch as Mr. Buckle's resolution asking for the removal of Chairman Dooly, which was introduced at the last meeting of the city council, is scheduled to come up tomorrow night at the council's special meeting, it is very probable that the foregoing opinion will also be submitted to that body by Mr. Dooly, and it is expected that opinions from other legal lights of the city will also be presented, and the matter thoroughly considered by the council.
