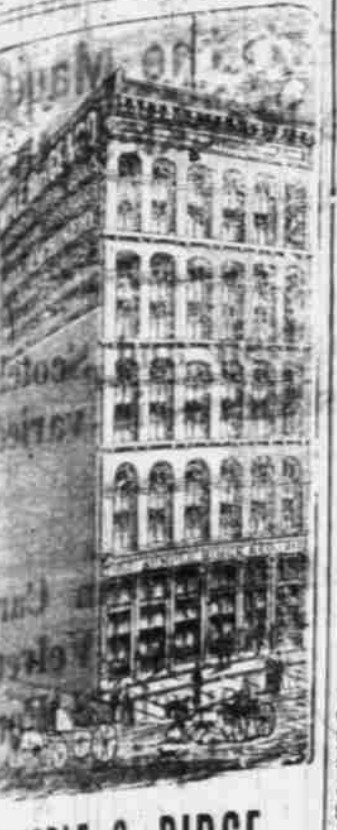

Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

HARRISBURG, Pa., 18.—Ex-President Grant and family arrived here this evening, and are the guests of D. Caperton. They will remain here until Friday.

Grand Oration to Gov. Hampton. CHARLESTON, S. C., 18.—The reception of Governor Hampton, who visited Charleston to-day, for the first time since November, was a grand ovation. The whole community, irrespective of political or class distinctions, were united. Governor Hampton rode at the head of the column through the streets, which were gaily decked with bunting and thronged with thousands, who cheered him wildly as he passed.

Storm-Freight Business. NEW YORK, 18.—A disagreeable easterly storm prevailed, to-day, and there was little or nothing doing at the wharves of the California bound ships. However, with pleasant weather to-morrow, the *Sovereign of the Seas* will be able to finish her landing.

The continued warlike news had a tendency to stiffen the views of agents so far as the rates of freight were concerned, but there has yet been no advance, nor is there likely to be immediately.

The Fire Commissioners. Adopted resolutions requiring all the proprietors and managers of places of amusement, hotels, churches, houses, and places where a large number of people congregate, to provide at once such measures for communicating alarm and extinguishing fires as the commissioners may prescribe and as directed by law.

The Times' Washington special announces the resignation of L. C. Carter, collector of internal revenue for Charleston. He says he will not be able to live in the State under a democratic government. His resignation was accepted reluctantly.

The Sealed Doors. The Times' Washington special says when the republican State officers attempted to open their rooms at the State House they found the doors sealed, and the constables present were ordered to arrest any one attempting to enter. A protest was promptly made to the judicial proceedings are now pending to settle the business. The republicans now excluded have a clear title till the *quo warranta* case against them is decided.

The Ruins of the Southern Hotel. ST. LOUIS, 18.—No bodies were found at the Southern Hotel ruins, to-day. Both safes were taken out. The contents uninjured. In the largest safe was a large amount of property of different kinds belonging to the guests and boarders. Among it was \$17,000 worth of diamonds, which were delivered to the owner. Some of the interior walls of the hotel are in a very shaky condition, to-day, in consequence of which work is suspended. This afternoon about four o'clock two of the inner walls, running at right angles with the Walnut Street front, fell with a great crash. No one was injured. Shortly after this a wind and rain storm passed over the city, and part of the southern wall of the west wing fell, crushing one-story stores on Fifth Street, just south of the wall. Another wall fell about 6 o'clock this evening.

To-morrow all the inner walls will be partially taken down, so that the search for the bodies can be resumed without danger.

River Improvements. WASHINGTON, 18.—Major Suter, of the engineer corps in charge of the improvements of the Mississippi, Missouri, and Arkansas rivers, will be instructed to make examinations, and report the extent and nature of the threatened danger at Omaha Council Bluffs, and submit an estimate of the probable cost of making such surveys.

Employees Discharged. Discharge of 300 employees of the bureau of engraving and printing of the Treasury Department, to-day, after the expiration of the contract. The indications are that before the middle of next week, at least 600 dismissals will be made of persons now in the employment of the government in this city.

New York Union House Commissioners. Two of the three gentlemen invited to accept the positions of commissioners to investigate the affairs of the New York Union House have accepted the office tendered them, but until the third day the accepted Sherman declines to say who the commissioners will be.

Removal of Renegade Indians. John F. Clum, Indian Agent at San Carlos Agency, Arizona, who was recently directed to remove about 100 renegade Apaches from the Hot Springs to San Carlos, reports to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs that he is on his way there, and requests authority to move 600 other Apaches at the Hot Springs to San Carlos. The Commissioner replied, granting the request, provided that he has power enough to enforce his authority. Agent Clum is supported in his expedition by a squad of military.

The State Department, to-day, received a cable from Brussels announcing the serious illness of A. J. Merrill, United States consul there.

Recognized Consul. The President has recognized Charles Henrotin consul of Turkey at Chicago.

Removal of the Call. The President, this afternoon, accompanied by Secretary Evans and Mr. Rogers, private secretary to the President, formally returned the call of the Russian Grand Duke.

Another Mining Decision. The Secretary of the Interior, on the 17th inst., in the case of the *Pinkerton Lode*, denied the claim of the *Pinkerton Lode* company, held that the present law as mining cases has no right to appeal from the decision of the Commissioner General of the Land Office. GREAT BRITAIN.

Eastern War Items.

LONDON, 18.—A telegram from Constantinople says a rumor is current that the Roumanian Government has resolved to concentrate 100,000 men for the protection of the capital against the sudden attack of the Turkish irregular troops.

A telegram from St. Petersburg says the Russian Government has decided to annul the declaration in virtue of England's declaration is annulled, Russia, whose hands are thus freed, will endeavor to accomplish Europe's mission in regard to Turkey.

A Paris correspondent states that the Mediterranean squadron of the United States obtained the requisite permission to pass through the Dardanelles from the Porte, and will immediately proceed to the Bosphorus.

The Vienna *Deutsch Zeitung* announces that the cabinets of Vienna, London, and Paris have notified Roumania that the privileges she enjoys by virtue of the treaty of Paris would be considered null and void should she actively co-operate with Russia.

The Times dispatch from Constantinople says it is rumored that the Porte intends to proclaim a state of siege. Greece is preparing, in case of war, to incite an insurrection in the Greek provinces of Turkey and in the island of Crete.

The Times Vienna dispatch says the fact that Gen. Ignatieff will accompany the Czar, would indicate the possibility of a turn in things in Constantinople favorable to direct negotiations between Russia and Turkey. As the Russian army advances towards the frontier, its place in Bessarabia is being taken by the troops coming from the frontier.

The Paris correspondent of the Times reports that couriers, bearing the Russian manifesto and addresses to the army, the nation and to Europe, will start simultaneously with the Emperor, and arrive at their destination at the same time his Majesty reaches Koenigsberg on Monday. On that day of the next the Czar will issue a manifesto to the army, which will be simultaneously delivered to the powers and to the Russian charge d'affaires, who will then quit Constantinople. This is the exact programme, given by the Emperor to his ministers.

The Times Berlin special presents that Persia, at Russia's bidding, threatens the Asiatic frontiers of Turkey.

A dispatch from Persia says it is reported that the Russians are moving troops from Odessa to Porti, with the view of attacking Turkey on the Asiatic side.

A Vienna special confirms the programme reported by the Times' Paris correspondent, and adds that Russia seems determined to avoid a real declaration of war. Her troops in Europe will remain on the defensive, but in Asia it is believed that she will commence hostilities at latest at the end of next week.

The Newmarket Handicap. At Newmarket, to-day, M. H. Lanford's American filly, Donna, won the Newmarket Handicap, by a large margin.

The distance run was about five-eighths of a mile. Ursula came in second and Playfair third. Nine horses ran. Pardon, who started the favorite, finished the seventh. Odds, twenty to one against the winner. Donna won easily.

San Francisco, 18.—

The Supreme Court, to-day, issued a peremptory writ mandating the Secretary of State to issue to Pacheco, the republican candidate for Congress for the fourth district, his certificate.
