The railroads are congested and can not deliver promptly. Raw material is hard to get, certain classes of limber are becoming scarces each. amber are becoming scarcer each year, and prices are steadily on the rise. Dulers say purchasers seem to still have plenty of money, there are many new houses in town that are now being furnished, and the demand is for the furnished, and the demand is for the best kinds of furniture. Local dealers are feeling that they are on easy street, and that they will be able to lay up for a future rainy day.

DRY GOODS SITUATION.

The wholesale dry goods trade to-cally is reported better this week than for the corresponding week of any previous year, contrary to general expectation, and the change is ascribed to the weather. There is a special demand for fleece goods, biankets and fine comforters, and that class, while the demand for prints, cottons, etc., is by no means inconsiderable. The city and country trade are both reported excellent. Jobbers report that ginghams, wash goods, lines of ticking, and some bleached sheetings are higher than a week ago, also an unprecedented demand for cottons as likely after Jan. I. In fact, certain lines of staple bleached and woven cottons are oversold by thousands of cases for delivery up to February, and this at a time of the sason when milis are generally well socked up with goods. There is a sarcity in white goods reported, full prices being paid for goods to be delivered in the next 30 days.

Wholesale clothing is booming. One of the best known salesmen on the road, James P. Murphy, of Milwaukee, reports unprecedented sales all over the reports unprecedented sales all over the country where he has been, as well as in this and adjoining states. He reports the prevailing styles in stripes and checks of a moderate pattern, the checks being quite small. He says the American worsteds, cassimirs and serges, are now equal to the best Scotch and English make, so that it is really to longer necessary to matronize scotch and English make, so that it is really no longer necessary to patronize foreign cloths. The trade among the local retailers is better this week, with the advent of cooler weather, and the prospects for the coming week are gratifying.

SHOE MARKET BUSY. The shoe market is still on the boom—the best it has ever been in this city, so the trade reports. In fact, it is claimed that the increase of busi-ness at present over that of the same time last year is three to one. People are reported as still calling for the best goods, and still willing to pay the highest prices to get the best article.

# TRADE CONTINUES

Colder Weather the Immediate Cause While Mercantile Collections Are Improved.

SALESMEN SENDING IN ORDERS

Future Prospects Never Brighter-Most Labor Disputes Amicably Settled.

New York, Nov. 16.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: "Trade expands under the stimulating influence of colder weather and mercantile collections are improved, although rates for money continued high. Traveling salesmen send in large orders to leading distributing points, but movements of merchandise are still retarded by inadequate transporting facilities. Seasonable lines of wearing apparel and holiday goods attract most attention, while staple articles of every description are in steady demand. Current business is good and prospects for the future were never brighter. Labor disputes reached amicable settlement in most cases wages being advanced in numerous transporting and manufacturing industries. The most striking development of the week was the unprecedented output of pig iron in conjunction with large imports and advancing prices, indicating the greatest activity ever attained by steel mills. Other industrial reports were scarcely less gratifying.

"Transactions continue large in hides, sales by the packers being estimated at over 190,000 hides for the week.

Recovery in wheat had the additional support of unsatisfactory receipts at the Northwest, and although the small movement was probably due in large measure to the car shortage, it gave rise to smaller estimates of the crop in spring wheat states. Flour out-put continues to make a poor compari-son with the milling returns of a year ago. An official statement further increasing the estimated corn crop pre-vented the cereal from participating fully in the upward tendency of prices. fully in the upward tendency of prices.

"Liabilities of commercial failures thus far reported for November amounted to \$2,325,428, of which \$883,501 (was in manufacturing, \$1,362,248 in trading, and \$80,581 in other commercial lines."
