

## SENATOR TILLMAN WAS SHADOWED

Secret Service Men, by Order of President, Camped on Trail of South Carolinian.

REPORT NOT MADE PUBLIC.

Orders to Sleigh Him Given on Theory That Possibly He Was Interested in Oregon Land Grab.

Washington, Jan. 7.—By direction of President Roosevelt, secret service men shadowed Senator Tillman of South Carolina, on the theory that he possibly was interested in an Oregon "land grab," and the report of that investigation is now before the senate.

The information was contained in a communication from President Roosevelt, sent in response to a request made by Senator Hale for a statement of the activities of the secret service operatives. Exhaustive replies were made by the various departments, and all of those were forwarded to Senator Hale by the president. They have not been made public, and Senator Hale announced that they would not be given out until after they had been considered by a sub-committee of the committee on appropriations, which will be charged with the duty of acting on that portion of the president's annual message relating to the secret service.

**PRESIDENT'S COMMUNICATION.**  
Soon after President Roosevelt's communication to Senator Hale was read at the Capitol it was said that it contained a reflection on a senator from a southern state. The nature of the reflection was not divulged at the time, and as a result the senate was surcharged with curiosity. When it finally became known that Senator Tillman was the member named, further efforts were made to procure information concerning the character of the charges, but they were unavailing.

Through the fact that several senators had advance information of the character of the report, it was learned that the investigation of Senator Tillman followed an attack made in the senate nearly a year ago on an Oregon land company, which had used his name as one of the persons interested in the company.

Precious to that attack Senator Tillman had introduced a resolution directing the attorney-general to prosecute suits against an Oregon railroad corporation that had received land grants for a line from California points to Portland, Ore. Mr. Tillman had said that the use of his name was without authority, and as a result it is declared that several persons interested in the land grants became angered. Some of the interested parties are reported to have sent to President Roosevelt copies of letters alleged to have been written by Senator Tillman, indicating that he had an interest either in one of the land companies or would be benefited through land companies obtaining possession of the grants in question. After receiving this information, it is said, the president directed a secret service operative to investigate the part Senator Tillman was alleged to have in the land cases.

The report is understood to contain an account of the investigation. It is known that the secret service prepared photographic copies of Senator Till-

man's correspondence, but whether these exhibits were sent to Senator Hale is not known.

Senator Tillman was not aware that his name figured in the reports until late in the day. He then assured himself that the reports were well founded, but said he would not make any statement until the fact of the use of his name had been officially promulgated, when he would discuss the matter in the senate.

It is known, however, that Mr. Tillman regards the mention of his name as an attack upon himself by the president, and he has indicated to his friends that he will not discuss matters in his reply. He has also declared to those with whom he conversed that he would welcome the opportunity to express his views and explain the situation.

Senator Hale will probably lay the entire matter before the committee on appropriations on Saturday, and in that event it is probable that Mr. Tillman will be heard on Monday.

On Feb. 19, 1908, Senator Tillman rose in the senate to a question of personal privilege, and said that his attention had been called to a scheme of swindling, in which his name had been used rather unpleasantly and without the slightest warrant. The senator held in his hand a circular headed "How to Make \$5,000 Out of \$200." This circular called attention to certain land grants in Oregon, and to the activity of Senator Tillman in having the senate investigate them. It stated that "Senator Tillman takes it quakers," and that the lawsuits to be instituted in order to recover these lands were promised to be pressed with great vigor because Senator Tillman was behind them.

**TILLMAN'S COMMENT.**

Commenting on this situation, Senator Tillman at the time said:

"As a matter of fact, I have not bought any lands anywhere in the west, nor undertaken to buy any. I have made some inquiries, as one naturally would in passing through the west. I simply want the people of the country to be put on notice that this swindler at Portland has no warrant whatever for endeavoring to inveigle others into the game."

Senator Tillman said further that he had asked the postoffice department to take cognizance of the circular. In the debate that followed an order to print the circular in the Congressional Record, it was brought out that the name of the company issuing the circular was "The St. Paul and Pacific Timber Syndicate, 325 Chamber of Commerce building, Portland, Ore."

Senator Tillman said he had read the circular, and that the scheme evidently "is for the company issuing the circular

to accumulate a vast fund of money by dupes throughout the country."

**THIS CIRCULAR.**

Portland, Ore., Jan. 7.—The circular to which Senator Tillman made objection was issued by the St. Paul & Pacific Timber company, which was alleged to have the backing of prominent St. Paul (Minn.) capitalists. It was represented here by a man named Bryan H. Dore. The circular was issued over Dore's name and he insisted that the company's objects and purposes were perfectly legitimate.

In brief, the scheme, according to Dore's circular, was to secure from a number of people the sum of \$200 each to defray preliminary expenses incident to locating land included in the Coos Bay Wagon Road land grant, to which the Southern Oregon company refused to sell the land for \$2.50 per acre, as the circular alleged it was obligated to do by the government grant, and a contingent fee of 25 cents per thousand feet of timber on each claim so located was to be levied by Dore's company to form a fund to prosecute suit against the Southern Oregon company to force it to sell it for that amount.

The portion of Dore's "How to Make \$5,000 Out of \$200" circular, to which Tillman took exception, follows:

"Among those who have spoken for a part of this land is Senator Tillman of South Carolina, the leader of the Democratic party in the United States senate, a man who usually gets what he goes after. So says Senator Tillman of our success that he has subscribed and paid the necessary fees for a quarter section for himself and to other quarter sections for 10 of his nearest relatives."

**ARBITRATION TREATIES SIGNED**

Washington, Jan. 7.—Secretary Root today signed arbitration treaties with Ecuador, Bolivia and Haiti. Next week Secretary Root hopes to sign with Ambassador Bryce a treaty for the reference to the Hague tribunal of disputed questions affecting the Newfoundland fisheries, for the settlement of pecuniary claims and for the boundary waters. With the exception of some claims that may have to be subtracted from the list, Mr. Root and Mr. Bryce have agreed on these treaties and they now wait the approval of the British foreign office.

**HENEY HAS NO USE FOR E. H. HARRIMAN**

Chicago, Jan. 8.—"E. H. Harriman wants control of the lake front in San Francisco. He also wants control of other things. In fact, he wants control of everything he can get. I have no retraction in make of the assertion I made in Philadelphia Jan. 5 that Harriman, through control of the Southern Pacific railroad, was responsible for corruption in San Francisco. This is the statement made by Francis J. Heney in Chicago, on his way west. "The trial of Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads of San Francisco, begins next Tuesday, and it is my desire to be there at that time," said Mr. Heney.

**PARIS GREEN IN CANDY.**

Enough Sent to Two Denver Women to Poison Fifty People.

Denver, Jan. 8.—Poison in the shape of Paris green sufficient to kill 50 people was found in the candy sent through the mails to Mrs. Marie Smith and Mrs. Amelia Wixee, according to State Chemist Edward C. Hill, who analyzed the contents of the boxes received by the two women last Saturday. Oats and Vaseline, children of Mrs. Smith, ate of the candy and were made seriously ill.

The police are trying to locate a former auditor of Mrs. Smith for the purpose of questioning him.

**PERKINS TO SUCCEED HIMSELF.**

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 7.—George C. Perkins was selected late tonight by the Republican joint caucus as his candidate for United States senator to succeed himself.

**HOW STANDARD OIL CO. SIMULATES OPPOSITION**

New York, Jan. 7.—Stating that the Standard Oil company had an employee whose duty it was to start supposed independent oil companies in small towns to simulate opposition to itself, L. J. Farnfield, general manager of the Red "L" company of Baltimore, today continued his testimony in the suit for the dissolution of the Standard Oil company. He said the Eagle Oil company was a simulated independent oil company, as a rule, were met by his company in order to hold its trade.

Asked by the Standard's counsel whether oil refiners did not have to offset losses in some places by increased profits in others, Mr. Farnfield replied in the affirmative. He added that in many instances his company had abandoned certain fields rather than compete with the low prices fixed by Standard Oil's offshoots masquerading as independent companies.

Warren Dixon of Baltimore, who said he had worked for several oil companies, was the last witness. He told of being sent with a wagon to solicit the trade of independent oil refiners by cutting prices. Afterward, while in the employ of the Eagle Oil company, he was sent to gather in the customers of independent companies by giving rebates. Dixon said that the Standard Oil company maintained its regular prices during the Baltimore oil war, the cuts being made by the Eagle Oil company, which he understood the Standard controlled.

**GOLDFIELD MINER ARRESTED.**

Goldfield, Nev., Jan. 7.—Louis Schloss, one of the principal owners of the Kowah mine, was arrested today on complaint of Tex Rickards, who charged him with having issued worthless checks to the amount of \$400. Schloss was released on \$1,000 bail. It is alleged that Schloss put up the checks to cover losses while playing in Rickards' gambling place.

**WARRANT ISSUED FOR "COUNT" LOUIS HAMON**

Paris, Jan. 7.—A warrant charging embezzlement was issued in this city today for the arrest of "Count" Louis Hamon, formerly known in America and Europe as "Cheiro, the painter," who went to London yesterday following the allegation that he defrauded two American women out of valuable stocks. It is pointed out, however, that if Hamon is a British subject he cannot be brought here from London as Great Britain does not permit the extradition of her citizens.

London, Jan. 7.—"Count" Louis Hamon, who left Paris yesterday after being charged by Mrs. Julia P. Newell and Miss Josephine Pomeroy of New York with defrauding them of stocks, said to be worth \$500,000, was located in London today. Mrs. Newell and Miss Pomeroy appealed to him a year ago, according to his story, to extricate them from a stock market deal in New York in which they were heavy losers. He succeeded in saving a part of their fortune and rendered them regular accounts.

Last November he says he called upon the two women to redeem their stocks, giving them plenty of notice. As they did not comply, the stock was sold, leaving, according to "Count" Hamon, \$7,500 due them. He says he is ready to pay the women whatever an expert appointed by a French court finds to be due them.

Under the French law a foreigner can be held in the country until he is satisfied against him are settled. "Count" Hamon declared he came to London on business. He denied his inability to meet the charges, asserting that had his transactions taken place in London or New York it would have been settled without trouble, but arising in Paris, it would cause him great inconvenience.

**MR. BRYCE TO LECTURE.**

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—James Bryce, the British ambassador, will deliver a course of lectures at the University of California next March. While the distinguished diplomat is here he will be the guest of honor at a banquet to be given by the Commonwealth club. He has indicated that he will accept of other invitations to functions of a public or semi-public character while on this coast as he wishes to read and devote his time solely to his lectures.

**TO REINSTATE CADETS.**

Washington, Jan. 7.—Senator Warren today reported from the committee on military affairs a bill providing for the reinstatement in West Point military academy of Wm. T. Russell, Jr., and Harry G. Weaver, the two first class men dismissed last August upon being convicted of the charge of hazing. Secretary of War Wright informed the committee that he did not object to the course proposed. The six third-class men who were suspended until June, 1908, are to be reinstated in March under the provisions of the bill.

**SWITCH THROWN OPEN. TRAIN WAS WRECKED**

Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 7.—Wrecked by hands who threw the switch open, locked it and put out the lantern so the engineer could not see the peril, Great

Northern train No. 272, northbound, left the trestle just south of Bellingham yards at Commercial Point at 5 o'clock tonight. The engine was almost completely submerged in the bay, the mail car and baggage car were smashed to bits, and the smoker was derailed. One person was killed and two were injured.

**INJURED.**

Engineer Jack Bailey, both legs crushed, amputation necessary. Mail Clerk George L. Rhodes of Seattle, right shoulder dislocated. The fireman's body sank with the engine and has not been recovered. The engineer went under, but came to the surface, struck out for a pile and clung there until rescued by a rowboat. The passengers, of whom there were 75, were badly shaken, but none was injured.

The local police and railroad detectives unite in declaring the wreck to have been deliberately planned. How the switch key came into the possession of anybody but the employee is a mystery.

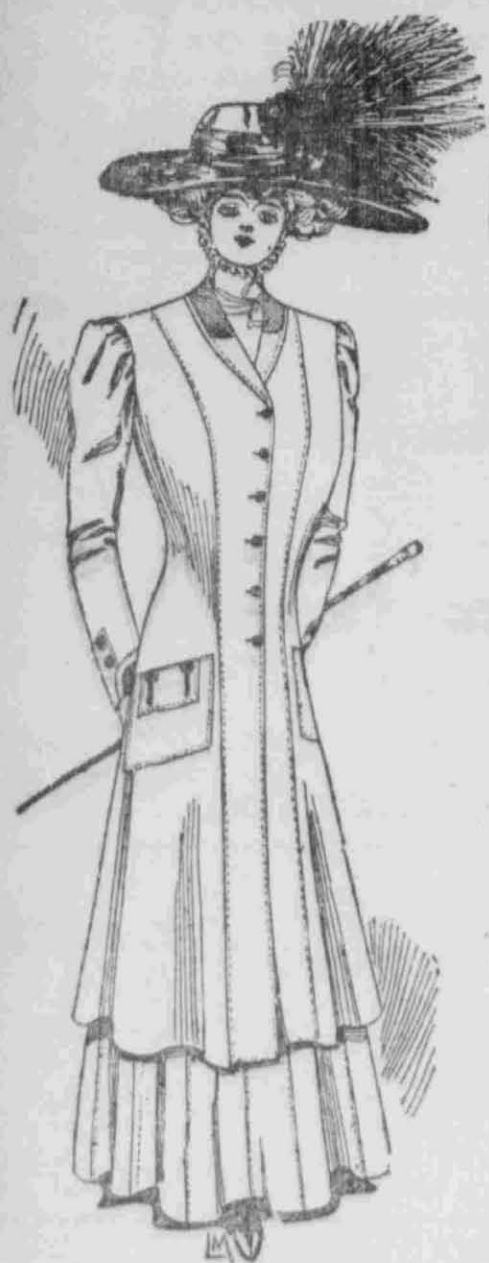
