New York, Jan. 7.—Stating that the Standard Oll company had an employe whose duty it was to start supposed-ly independent oll companies in small towns in seeming opposition to itself, J. H. Fasenfield, general manager of the Red "I." company of Baltimore, today continued his testimony in the suit for the dissolution of the Stand-ard Oll company. He said the Eagle Oll company was such a concern, and its cuts, as a rule, were met by his company in order to hold its trade.

Asked by the Standard's counsel whether oil refiners did not have to off-set loases in some places by increased profits in others, Mr. Fasenfield rephed in the affirmative. He added that in many instances his company had abandoned certain fields rather that compete with the low prices fixed by Standard offshoots masquerading as independent companies. Watren Dixon of Baltimore, who said he had worked for several off companies, was the last witness. He told of being sent with a wagon to solicit the trade of independent ped-filers by cutting prices. Afterward, while in the employ of the Eagle Oli company, he was sent to gather in the customers of independent companies by giving rebates. Dixon said that the Standard Off company maintained its regular prices during the Baltimore oil war, the cuts being made by the Eagle Oli company, which he understood the Standard controlled.
