The City Council met last night at President Lounsbury's in the chair. The members present were: Rich, Follen, Harty, Kariert, Moran, Kelly, Hevans, Beardsley, Lawson, Wadsworth, Stinson—19.

A. J. O'Neil, Irish, was second.

The minutes of Friday night's meeting were read and approved.

The Proceedings.

John L. Lynch and others asked that Green Island be widened. It was referred to a special committee consisting of Follen, Wentland and Stinson.

John Shephard asked to leave the city and bars. Committee on police grounds.

D. P. Torrey regreted that in the construction of public buildings the city could furnish as good native building as there was in the Territory at a lower price than was now being charged. He therefore asked commission at the hands of the council.

H. Gardiner asked that certain property sold for taxes be released. It was referred to the city attorney.

The city recorder reported that water main intention No. 145 had been published as requested by law, and that there had been but one objection filed. That was in the case of W. G. Morgan.

SUCCEEDS DAVENPORT.
The Mayor sent in a communication appointing Joseph Hoby a member of the regular police force, to succeed J. Davenport, resigned. Received in file and appointment confirmed.

The Mayor also reported: In matter of the relief on taxes of court persons referred to me on Decem 21st, with power to act, I beg to report that I am not vested with the power to remit in whole or in part the tax of any one but that this power was the law rests with the council, therefore herewith return the paper you for such action in the premises may deem just and proper.
