



Missouri Railroads Discharge **Employes in All Departments** To Cut Expenses.

GOULD ORDERS MANY CUTS.

List of Lines Considering Retrenchments Presents Alarming Possibilities of Increasing Burdens.

St. Louis, March 2 .- According to a recapitulation of statements of Missouri railroad officials, published here today, about 10,000 employes in the operating, mechanical and clerical de partments have been dismissed recently to offset heavy revenue losses suffered by the roads. It is estimated by the state railroad commission that probably 8,000 of the present unemploy-of force have been laid off during the past 15 days. The Chicago & Alton management

Past 15 days. The Chicago & Alton management snonunced today that its 100 passenger train collectors would be dispensed with. Employes retained by the "Cot-ton Belt" road, it is announced, have been required to lay off five days each month without pay until further no-tice. tice.

MORE HEAVY CUTS.

MORE HEAVY CUTS. Sweeping retrenchments have been ordered by the Gould interests operat-ing the St. Lodis, fron Mountain & Southern and Missouri Pacific roads. The operating officials of the Frisco-were in conference today at Spring-neld, Mo., to reduce operating expenses until the crops begin to move next fail. The Missouri, Kansas & Texas road has put into ecect mapy economics, which, according to one of the officials, have cut down operating expenses \$75,-000 a month. The Louisville & Nash-ville, Mobile & Ohio, Southern railway and many other roads operating to the south out of here have made a 10 per cent cut in the wages of all employees not identified with labor organizations. The Wabash has laid off a number of men and closed down its repair shops.

A high official of one of the principal Missouri lines said that the roads ter-minating in St. Louis have economized to the total extent of \$1,500,000 a

SENATOR ALLISON'S RECORD.

SEEKING TO ADVANCE COLORADO LAND CASES

Washington, March 2.—In the su-preme court of the United States to-day Solicitor General Hoyt moved the advancement on the docket of the crim-inal proceedings against a number of prominent people of Colorado on the charge of conspiracy in appropriating coal and timber lands in that state. In these cases the district court failed to return verdicts of guilty, on the ground that no offense had been committed under section 5,440 of the Revised Statutes, which was relied upon for their conviction.
