Sheriff Emery Discovers Plot to Break ing the past 24 hours, and has now be-come of secondary importance. The area under its immediate influence in-cludes the southeastern portion of the country, with the crest of the "high" over the central Gulf coast. Although temperatures have risen decidedly over the Gulf and Atlantic states during the past 24 hours, yet the weather over that portion of the country is still ab-normally cold. The "low" noticed over Manitoba yesterday morning has been discovered by Sheriff Emery and his jailers and what might have been a serious outbreak has been prevented. At the present time there are 55 men in normally cold. The "low" noticed over Manitoba yesterday morning has moved rapidly eastward during the past 24 hours, undergoing at the same time a marked development in energy. The entire lake region is now under the sphere of its influence. The low area over the north Pacific coast remains stationary, but appears to be slowly de-veloping in energy. AMERICAN BUILT TORPEDO BOATS FOR RUSSIA.



Ten torpedo boats for the Russian navy are under construction at the Ram-say shipyard at Perth Amboy, N. J. These boats are about ninaty feet in length and each has seventy-two ribs or frames. The plating is an eighth of an inch in thickness. They are of very light construction, but are as strong as steel can make them without sacrificing speed to weight. Each boat is to be driven by two propellers set for high speed. The utmost secrecy has been maintained concerning the building of these little ships, and the yard is guarded day and night, no one being permitted to inspect the work. Lewis Nixon, under whose supervision the boats are being built and who devised the motor which will be employed, returned recently from Russia.
