compressed excitement pervades the Pomona, Cal., April 13 .- A battleroyal | town tonight. Crowds are on the streets and groups collected in many places is being waged here between the Southern Pacific Rallway company and discussing the railroad situation.

The citizens are taking a determined stand against the Southern Pacific, and sharp vigil is being maintained along First street. One hundred special po men are on duty, armed with pick and ax handles, and the members of the home guard have been sworn in as deputies, with revolvers. Fifty men are sleeping in a stable, ready to re spond at a moment's notice, and as many more citizens will turn out at the sound of the fire bell if any move is made by the Southern Pacific to lay the tracks on the disputed route.
