NEW RATE ON ORES.

Short Line Will Grant a Rate of \$4 Per Ton on Wood River Product.

In speaking of the new rate the Wood River Times says: "Every miner here knows, that for every ton of first class are shipped--that is, of ore carrying 60 to 33 per cent of lead, with one or more ounces of silver to the per ceut of lead, be-sides some gold--at least two tons of lower grade ore has been left in place in the mine or on the dumps. This second or third class ore hat constitues been jigged by hand; but it seldom pays.

pays. "But with this new rate this ore can be shipped as it comes from the mine, and although the profit will not be very large, it will nevertheless be suffcient to pay the cost of mining, haul-

'If the smelters will do as the railroad is doing, namely, reduce charges, they will soon be getting a great deal of ore from Wood River that has heretofore not been available for commercial purposes, and, at the same time, induce a resumption of operations at many promising properties in this region.
