AMERICA NOT AGGRESSIVE.

Movement to Protest Against Mikado's Folicy in Manchuria Would Have Only Moral Support.

Washington, Feb. 19,-Information from unofficial and individual sources evidencing the aggressiveness of Japan in Marchuria has been accumulating in the state department for some time. That this condition is irritating in increasing degree to China is also a matter of knowledge here. It is stated with authority, however, that in no manner has the Chinese government brought the matter to the attention of brought the matter to the attention of the American government, and no re-port on the subject is looked for. A remarkable explanation of the at-titude of our government in this impor-tant matter is devoloped as a result of inquiry directed toward officials who cannot be quoted but are in a position to direct our policies. In effect it is as follows:

LOSING OUR FOOTHOLD.

It is frankly admitted that America is losing her commercial foothold in the orient. This loss, however, is not harged to Japan. Rather it is asserted o be the effect of the growing tendency ward internal governmental regula-on in the United States. As an illusor this, attention is called to

### WAR ON STANDARD OIL.

The domestic war, as it is character-ized, against the Standard Oll company, which is credited with the largest orl-ental trade of any American enterprise, is declared to have been disastrously efis declared to have been disastrously ef-pective in the orient, while the tobacco and cotton goods trades are said to have been dealt heavy blows through the operation of railroad regulation here. From this point it seemed easy for gov-ernment officials here conversant with foreign matters to view Japanese com-service accreasion in Manchuria with 8 ercial aggression in Manchuria with a mercial aggression in Manchuria with a greater degree of complaisance that would be the case in the face of an ergent domestic demand for govern-mental assistance. Japan, it is assert-ed, can without great difficulty justify everything she has done in Manchuria as sanctioned by the "open door" policy initiated by the late Seey. HOW JAPAN HAS MOVED.

While Japan may justify these things While Japau may justify these things in the strictest sense under the "open doo" policy, it has been charged that there exists evidences of her use of many methods and practises which might not bear the light of impartial levestigation. It was then discovered that the bowels had become twisted and his condition was found to be such that surgeons held out little hope for his recovery.
