Complaints Issued Charging Floto Circus Officials With Manslaughter.

Twin Falls, Ida., May 28.—Criminal proceedings have been commenced against certain officials and employes of th Selfs-Fiero circus, in connection with the killing of the daughter of S. E. Rozell by an escaped tiger, Saturday evening, May 25. The circus people agreed to do the right thing in the mat-ter, but failed to keep their word, and convolutes charging maniaguistic were ter, but failed to keep their word, and complaints charging manifaughter were sworn to by the father of the child. Those named are H. H. Tammen, Frank Tammen, J. F. Bonfiels and Chris O'Niel. The latter was the keeper of the animals, and it is alleged that after opening the tiger's cage to feed the beast, he turned for a moment and it was then that the tiger made its escape, and the tragedy followed.
