The acclamations were renewed when, later, King Alfonso proceeded to the Elysse palace, where President Loubet held a garden party which was attended by the diplomatic corps, the cabinet ministers and leading officials. His majesty greatly admired the grounds of the palace, which were de-corated with flowers and illuminated by corated with flowers and illuminated by 10,000 electric lamps, and remained there until midnight. Cheering crowds still filled the streets when he return-ed to the Palace d'Orsay. King Alfonso has announced his in-tention of awarding the Spanish medal for military merit to the officers and soldiers who were wounded or thrown from their back backs of the oxplofrom their horses owing to the explosion, Magistrates have searched for in-criminating documents at the residence of the Spanish anarchist, Malato, who was arrested, but who refused to reply to questions without legal advice. ## Land Entries Limited.

Washington, June 1.-The commis-sioner of the general land office has is-sued instructions to registers and re-ceivers of land offices throughout the ceivers of land offices throughout the country, directing that in the future no one person shall be permitted to ac-quire more than 220 acres of non-min-eral public land under existing laws. Heretofore applicants have been per-mitted to increase that quantify under the timber and stone and soldier ad-ditional homestead laws.
