DEATH OF HONORED PIONEER.

Clark Ames Goes to Rest at 74—Mild Winter in Star Valley. Special Correspondence. Fairview, Wyo., Jan. 24.—This morning Clark Ames died at the residence of his son, Oliver. Mr. Ames was born in the state of New York in 1832 and came to Utah in 1849, settling in Salt Lake valley. He has since resided in Sevier, Boxelder, and Cache counties. He and wife, Mary, have six children, three sons and three daughters. He leaves 11 grown children and a host of grandchildren to perpetuate his good name. Star Valley is still honored with one of the original 1847 pioneers in the person of Aaron Nebeker. His health has been poor of late, and he has recently lost his sight entirely. Generally speaking the health of the people is exceptionally good. It would be hard to find another community with so many children, and so few deaths as have occurred here in Star Valley. The winter thus far has been unusually mild and pleasant for this part of the country. Orson F. Allred has gone to Ogden to undergo an operation for appendicitis. There is talk of a rail being built through the valley to the near future.

BIG REALTY DEAL. Wells on Dry Farms Ease Burdens of Husbandmen. Special Correspondence. Bancroft, Bannock Co., Idaho, Jan. 2.—A real estate deal of considerable magnitude has just been consummated. For a consideration, said to be about \$6,000, Geo. H. Fisher, formerly of Oxford, Idaho, bought the brick residence, 13 town lots and three business lots on Main street together with the store and other buildings, situated thereon, from A. P. Dolbeer. About 25 cars of grain have been shipped from here this fall. A load of cattle is frequently shipped and occasionally a car of hogs. Two well boring outfits have been busy for over a year and the dry farmers living out of town a few miles are now certainly a happy lot of people. They can now dry farm with considerable satisfaction that they do not have to have water for themselves and their animals. The soil of this locality is not surpassed anywhere. The grain and vegetables grown are of excellent quality. All that is needed is more energetic people and a little capital to help development. If the water supply could be increased sugar beets could be successfully grown, as the soil is well adapted for that purpose.



A NOVEL AMERICAN ENTERPRISE—SHIPPING WATER FROM THE JORDAN.



The picture affords a vivid illustration of a remarkable new American enterprise. The project of shipping water from the Jordan river, the traditional scene of Christ's baptism, has actually been carried out. Numerous difficulties had to be overcome. It was necessary to convey the water seventy miles across the mountains of Judea to the seacoast, and casks were not to be had. Wood for them had to be brought from Asia Minor. Permission of the sultan and of the patriarch of Jerusalem was necessary and finally was secured. Colonel C. E. Nadaud of Kentucky brought the scheme to a working basis.

Iceland's Political Corruption.

Special correspondent, writing in the Pall Mall Gazette of the movement in Iceland for absolute self-government, says that by degrees the demands were formally acceded to—including the appointment of a resident minister responsible to the Althing, or representation of the people, and after the advent of the present King Frederick of Denmark it was believed that all subjects of contention were now happily disposed of. "This, however—as a letter from the Danish capital shows—is not the case. In that famed 'Isle of Snow and Fire' a new political eruption has broken out. It must not be forgotten that though the Icelanders are, like the Danes, of Norse Germanic origin, they speak a language of their own, even as is the case between Norwegians and Swedes. It is in Iceland pretty well still the strong old tongue of the Edda, the ancient Scripture of the north. Hence Dane and Iclander do not easily understand each other. Centuries ago the Icelanders were a free commonwealth, with no hereditary ruler. Of that long bygone past the people are proud even now; and being generally well educated, they keep
