PAYS TO WORK PRISONERS

The Expenses of Meals and Medicine Is Greatly Curtilled.

During the Month Prior to Working 3,351 Meals Were Served, while Last Month There Were 1,110 Less.

As an indication of the benefits of the chain gang, there are now on an average about ten men on the boule-vard each week, whereas at the time the present system was adopted there were about twenty-three men in the

gang. The month prior to the working of the prisoners there were served at the city jail 3.351 meals, at 7% cents per-mesi. During the following month the prisoners worked, there were served just 1,100 meals less, and the number is gradually decreasing. Besides cut-ting down the expenses to a great ex-tent.
