Gov. Cutler today mailed a letter to every member of the State Legislature asking an expression of his views in regard to the state appropriating \$25.-000 for the relief fund. A copy of the letter follows:

"You have by this time read the sad news of the terrible calamity which has come to San Francisco and vicinity. In answer to a telegram sent by me yesterday to Governor George C. Par-dee. I received the following answer: 'Oakland, Cal., Governor Cutler, Salt Lake: Have asked mayor of Ogden and Salt Lake to send provisions to 300,000 shelterless and foodless San Francisco people. Need is great and immediate. Answer. Oakland.

"Before this telegram was received, a meeting of the state officials had dis-cussed the advisability of calling im-mediately a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of making an appropriation. Later I called together a number of representative citizens and heavy taxpayers, and the opinion was unanimous that the state should make an appropriation of \$25,000, but it would be unnecessary to call a special ses-sion to make the appropriation. A resolution was unanimously carried to the effect that I confer immediately with the nine hold-over state senators and obtain their consent to the state giving \$25,000 to the relief fund. The following letter was accordingly sent to the nine hold-over senators:

"'We expect local parties to advance \$25,000 as Utah's gift to the suffering and needy of Callfornia; provided the nine hold-over senators pledge support of measure at next regular session of Legislature making appropriation to cover same. Will you pledge your support of such measure? Please anwer by letter immediately, John C. Cutler, Governor.' "As a member of the present Legis-
