ENGLISH WOMAN ON WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Mrs. Philip Snowden, Wife of a Member of Parliament, Speaks in Carnegie Hall.

SOCIETY LEADERS PRESENT.

Speaker Declared It Was No Fun to Spend Three Months in a Lonely Cold Cell.

New York, Dec. 4.—An audience of women that filled Carnegie hall to the topmost gallery paid enthusiastic tribute to Mrs. Philip Snowden, wife of a member of the British parliament, and a leader of woman suffrage in England, as she told tonight of the suffragists in her native country. Mrs. Snowden was the principal speaker at the mass meeting, which was presided over by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, chairman of the interurban woman suffrage council, and at which Rev. Dr. Charles F. Aked, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Baptist church, and Rabbi Stephen were the other speakers.

Mrs. Snowden made her plea with youthful energy and earnestness. In telling of the picture the newspapers would draw of the district in the suffragettes in England, she displayed a keen sense of humor.

Rev. Dr. Aked in the course of his address scored both of the leaders in American political parties and declared he did not know which was the worst. He pointed this comment with the story of a man, who, being worsted in a debate with a woman, exclaimed as a last resort: "Well, no man ever had seven devils cast out of him."

"No," replied the woman, "the devils are still in the man."

"The devils have not been cast out of one of the political parties," declared Dr. Aked, "and they are still in the other. One is different only in its attempts to be worse than the other. What sort of condition can it be that brings justices of your supreme court to your district attorney to grovel before a retired rum-seller and chief of the Tammany wigwag?"

Dr. Aked's reference to the recent dinner to Richard Croker and his declaration that the birth of a new imperialism is noted in American politics, won applause.

Prominent women leaders of New York society occupied the boxes to-night. Mrs. Clarence Mackay, being one of the organizers of the meeting.

Mrs. Snowden told the story of the suffrage movement in Great Britain. She declared that despite the fact that some of the papers would picture the suffragettes as "altogether and hopelessly disreputable," they were asking for nothing new in Great Britain.

"It was only in 1832 that British women were legally disqualified from full exercise of the right of suffrage. Even now they may vote for every governing and administrative body in the kingdom, with the exception of the parliament. It is the right to vote for parliament that they seek. Three-fourths of the members of the present parliament are pledged to support woman suffrage, and the suffrage bill recently passed its second reading by a vote of 3 to 1. But even if all the members of parliament were in favor of suffrage, we cannot gain the desired legislation so long as the cabinet remains divided. It is with the cabinet ministers in England that our fight lies. They are all-powerful."

Mrs. Snowden explained the difference between the old suffrage society in Great Britain and the new suffragette organization. One of the chief functions of the new society, she declared, is to advertise the movement.

"We have got to keep the subject alive," she said. "It is in advertising the movement that you people have heard the most of, but don't imagine that women are going to prison for the cause, that they are risking their lives at public meetings for the fun of the thing. It is no fun to spend three months in a lonely, cold English cell. It is no fun to be kicked like a football down three or four flights of stairs. I have seen pale little women struggling with great burly men, feeling that their own little dignity were nothing compared to the dignity of a lofty principle and a mighty cause. You women of America live under a greater enlightenment. If American women were treated the way some English women have been, there would be lynchings in this country."

Mrs. Snowden urged the American women to join with their English sisters in the fight for the right of ballot.

Rev. Dr. Aked said he based his plea for woman suffrage rather upon what women would give than upon what they would receive. He believed they would be less corrupt than men in the exercise of the ballot, because they are less ignorant than men, less drunken and less criminal.

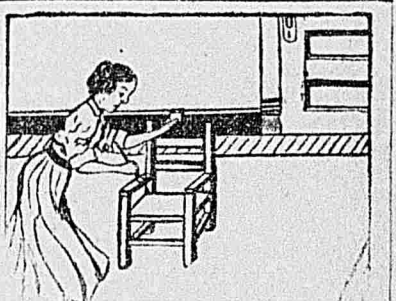

HAYTIAN ARMY IS SUPERSTITIOUS

Gen. Simon and His Men Would Have Entered Port au Prince Yesterday but it Was Friday.

Port au Prince, Dec. 4.—Gen. Simon, with his army, is at the gates of Port au Prince, awaiting until tomorrow to enter the capital triumphantly at the head of his 5,000 men. Had it not been that today was Friday, a day that to superstitious Haytiens is one of ill-omen, the 35 miles separating them from the capital would have proved no obstacle, and tonight the victorious revolutionists would have been within the city.

The delegation sent out from Port au Prince yesterday met Gen. Simon today at the cross-roads, where recent-

ly the government troops were entrenched, where he is lodged at the Villa Monrepa, a fine house built by ex-President Hippolyte. The general assured the delegates that his men were well disciplined and would make a peaceful entry into Port au Prince.

Among the lower classes Gen. Simon is very popular. The better classes are more reserved in their opinion and would have preferred a man more resigned for the presidency. They are resigned, however, to accepting Gen. Simon.

Gen. Le Conte, former minister of the interior, will embark at St. Thomas, D. W. I., on a French mail steamer tomorrow and proceed to Cape Haytien, where he will land Sunday. Gen. Firmin is on board the steamer Virginia, bound for St. Thomas for Port au Prince, by way of Kingston. No news has been received here concerning the movements of Gen. Fouchard.

Gen. Jules Colson, chief of Port au Prince, today took refuge in a seminary. Groups stood in front of the building for a while, but soon were dispersed.

The city of Port au Prince is tranquil and from the country districts have come no reports of disorder.

Washington, Dec. 4.—Dispatches received by the state department from Minister Furness today point out that there is no government in Hayti at this time, and in fact, no "President Legitimé." Legitimé, Mr. Furness explains, is merely chairman of the committee

on public safety. Gen. Simon has arrived at Port au Prince and the public safety committee will arrange for a special session of congress, and the details of a government will then be worked out.

FIGHT WITH HOLD-UPS IN GOLDFIELD BARROOM

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 4.—A battle took place early this morning at the bar and gambling room of the Hotel Casey, between two masked holdup men and William Floyd, dealer of the roulette game. Floyd, a bartender, and a porter were in the room when the high-tail men entered, one carrying two automatic revolvers and the other a sawed-off shot gun. The men ordered all hands up, but Floyd drew his revolver and began to shoot, dodging behind an icebox and shooting left-handed. The walls and doors were riddled with bullets and buckshot. It is believed that one of the bandits was hit, but both escaped. Under Sheriff Knight has arrested two men who are believed to have been implicated in the holdup.

HAZING AN EPIDEMIC.

President James of Illinois Makes Appeal for Its Suppression.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—An appeal to colleges, parents, public officials and the press to unite in an effort to stop hazing has been issued by President Edmund J. James, of the University of Illinois. He describes hazing as a sort of annual epidemic.

"It breaks out at the beginning of the year," the appeal reads, "and rages for a time like a fever. It is difficult to eradicate, owing to the sentiment of parents and public officials, who, while condemning the thing in the abstract, in a mild sort of way, practically support it by refusing to regard it as anything more than a bit of harmless play."

WORKERS IN SLUMS HAVE A FREE HAND

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Slum workers have free access to saloons and are privileged to use all the persuasive power at their command, so long as they do not resort to real violence, according to the ruling of Municipal Judge Blake yesterday.

Miss Elizabeth Duffy, connected with

the Moody Bible institute, was charged with creating a disturbance at the saloon of Thomas Kerwin, because she pleaded with customers in the house to throw away the contents of their glasses.

She was released by the court.

BOOKMAKER SWALLOWED EVIDENCE AGAINST HIM

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Chief Shipley's gambling squad released an alleged hand bookmaker yesterday because no ate the evidence against him.

J. P. MORGAN BOUGHT THE AMHERST CAXTONS

London, Dec. 5.—It was definitely announced that the purchaser of the 15 Caxtons from the famous library of Lord Amherst of Hackney, which were bought at private sale Wednesday prior to the auction sale of the library, was J. Pierpont Morgan. A large sum was paid for them.

GERMAN COLONIAL BUDGET.

Berlin, Dec. 5.—The colonial budget includes an original appropriation of \$150,000 to be followed by \$32,000 annually for the erection and maintenance at Tsing Tao, in the German territory of Kiau Chau, China, of schools for the Chinese natives where instruction in technical matters will be given.
