DEPORTED FROM TELLURIDE.

Had Gone There as Counsel for Fedcration-Favors Restoration of the Planet to Human Family.

Boise, Ida., July 2 .- Max Malich. Joe Meheliet and Billy Adams, three of the men seriously implicated in alleged misconduct at Globeville, Denver and Cripple Creek, on the word of Harry Orchard, went on the stand today as witnesses for W. D. Haywood and made denial of Orchard's testimony. Malich swore that Orchard and not he suggested the inhuman plot of dynamiting a boarding house full of

dynamiting a boarding house full of non-union smeltermen at Globeville, and that Orchi'd originated the idea of killing MacDonald, one of the Matich's business rivals. He said he had been burned by some mysterious acid, thrown into his house by an unknown hand, but he denied that this acid was really "Petithone dope" that had been left in his room by Steve and Annie Adams. He also denied that "Fettibone dope" had been used in burning his store, and testified that he was at his ranch when the fire occurred. He also swore that Orchard had told him that but for Gov. Steunenberg he would be rich, and that he intended to kill Steu-enberg. and even partial paralysis and loco-motor ataxia. Pueblo, Col., July 2.—Former Sheriff J. L. Beeman said today that Orchard had no connection with the attempt to wreck the Florence and Cripple Creek train, as Orchard had testified. He said while sheriff the Teller county authorities brought to Pueblo a man negred Charles Beckman, an employ said while sheriff the Teller county authorities brought to Pueblo a man named Charles Beckmain, an employe of the Thiel detective agency. Beck-man was jailed with Charles McKinney, who was accused of the attempted train wrecking. In hopes of getting a con-fession from him. Before going to jall on this mission, Beeman says. Beckman related a story of his experi-ences. He said he was a detective and a member of the Western Federa-tion of Miners' "inner circle," The "inner circle." Beckman asserted, de-signated him and several others to wreck the train. He reported the mat-ter to Scott, special agent for the rail-road company, and Sterlfng, special agent for the mine owners; and went with them to the scepe of the proposed wreck, where they saw men pull spikes from the rails. After gaining the confession from McKinney, Beckman left Colorado for parts unknown, saying that this coun-try would be too hot for him.

Between Honduras, Guatemala And Salvador to Defeat Consolidation.

DIAZ' ACTION IMPORTANT.

He Refused to Act With Micaragua in An Attack on Guatemala Then Zelaya Yielded.

Puerto Cortez, Honduras, June 27. (via New Orleans, July 2.)—Within the last few days a new combination has appeared on the Central American has appeared on the Central American checkerboard of five republics where President Zelaya has been maneuver-ing for several months by means of revolutionary plots to consolidare the five countries under one government. The new combination is reported to be Honduras, Guatemala and Salvador. Their understanding was made at Tegueigalpa, Honduras' capital, and aims at defeat of the consolidation. Special ministers from Guatemala and Salvador cecognized provisional Persident David as president of Hon-

special ministeries from Guardense and Salvador cecognized provisional President Davila as president of Hon-duras, and he agreed, as reported in Washington dispatches, to act inde-pendently of the control of Nicaragua, Zelaya's candidate for the Honduran presidency was Terencio Sierra, and in recognizing Davila the Guatemalan and Salvadorean diplomats strength-ened the hold of a president hostile to Zelaya and thereby robbed the lat-ter of the fruits of his successful Hon-duran war, namely, the opportunity to name a president who would obey him.

name a president who would obey him. The first move of the new combina-tion was to force the evacuation of Honduras by Nicaraguan troops. Since the evacuation the defeated generals of former President Manuel Bonilla have been returning to their country, and some of them have been invited on missions to Tegucigalpa, which is considered significant. It is reported that Zelaya did not yield to the demand for evacuation until his envoy, Gomez, who recently conferred with President Diaz to act with Niciragua in an attack upon Guatemala. It is reported also that Nicaragua has already spent between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 in the at-tempts to place men of Zelaya's choice in the presidential chairs of other republics, and that the peo-ple are discontented with the large ex-penditures. Nicaragua issued about \$2,000,000 in treasury motes a perpenditures. Nicaragua issued about \$2,000,000 in treasury notes, a per-centage of which were to be redeemed in customs duties.

Blame for the failure of the recnt Blame for the failure of the reent riot in Salvador in which Nicaraguans participated is laid partly to the choice of Dr. Alfaro as leader. It is said that many Salvadoreans were ready for revolution, but that they would not follow Alfaro, preferring Gen. Barahona, who, however, was not pleasing to President Zelaya.

The Copper River railroad which is known throughout Alaska as the Guggenheim proposition, alming to tap the Copper river district, is attempting to cross the right of way of the Alaska-Pacific company, known as the Bruner line, which also almis for the Copper river district by way of Lake Charlotte. "From this time forward." declared Senator Borah, "we are going to insist that the rules of evidence be strictly adhered to."

Mr. Englee said he had been called upon by Haywood to defend some of the members of the Western Federation at Telluride. He told of the organization of the Citizens' alliance and the Mine Owners' association and the bringing of gun-men into the district. More or less trauble followed the arrival of the

of gun-inen into the district. More or less trouble followed the arrival of the gun-men aud militia. Proceedings to tell of the hubeas corpus proceedings insti-tuted to relieve men from the bull pen, Gen. Engles said: "On the day of the hearing of the habeas corpus proceedings, the prison-ers were hrought to the court house by the militia. A Gatling gun was mount-ed in the courthouse square and sharp shooters were placed in commanding positions. The prisoners were brought into court, surrounded by soldiers with fixed bayonets. I refused to proceed with the argument on a constitutional question, while I was surrounded by bayonets and I walked out of the court house followed by Mr. Murphy, general counsel for the Western Federation of Miners."

Bruner right of way. The Copper river road is now built about 20 miles from Katalia, the Brun-er road so far has done nothing bui terminal work at Katalia. Since its start a few months ago there has been constant trouble between the Bruner

Sev-eral times the right of way of the Gug-genheim road has been dynamited when the Bruner engineers claim the Copper river road has crossed their territory. An injunction asked recently by the Alaska-Pacific Railway & Terminal company against the Guggenheim road was denied. was denied
