May 16 .- The persistent fight on the part of the residents on Lincoln arenue against the Bamberger road entering the city under steam power has now ended, regardless of the fact that President Bamberger of the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad has sent a munication to the council wthdrawing his petition for the using of steam

ing his petition for the using of steam importantly on Lincoln avenue. The latest move in the case now on the part of the petitioners who are fighting the interurban road is asking for the removal of the rails which have been laid on that street for a year or more. It is claimed by the peti-tioners that the street is damaged for remue and that the track in places is ioners that the street is damaged for traffic and that the track in places is beve the grade of the street. They ask that the track be removed or be such low enough that it would not be a menace to vehicles. Bamberger's right to use Lincoln avenue expired last November, when the terms of the franchise expired, and he has practically had nothing to do upon that street since that time. The Ogden Rapid Transit company has been awaiting for an opportunity

has been awaiting for an opportunity to extend its line over Lincoln avenue to the southwest part of town. A repto the southwest part of fown. A fep-psentative of the latter company stat-ed that in the event of Bamberger's tracks on Lincoln avenue being or-dered removed by the city council, a street car line will be built at an early

date. Mr. Bamberger, it is vouched for by representatives of the road, will not attempt to enter the center of Ogden this year, and will remain at the south end of the city until he gets the road electrified, which will probably be done next year. A temporary depot will be erected at the corner of Lincoln avenue and Thirty-first street, and that will be the present terminal of the road and to which a line of 'buses will be operated from the center of the city during the summer.
