OPPOSITION TO BAMBERGER LINE

Not Lessened by Abandonment of Steam as a Power—Sinner Motives Apparent.

CITY BOARD OF EDUCATION

Dr. R. S. Joyce Resigns—Quick Justice—Suspended Burglars Arrested—Blind Pupils Give Recital.

Ogden, May 16.—The persistent fight on the part of the residents on Lincoln avenue against the Bamberger road entering the city under steam power has now ended, regardless of the fact that President Bamberger of the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad has sent a communication to the council withdrawing his petition for the using of steam temporarily on Lincoln avenue.

The latest move in the case now on the part of the petitioners who are fighting the interurban road is asking for the removal of the rails which have been laid on that street for a year or more. It is claimed by the petitioners that the street is damaged for traffic and that the track in places is above the grade of the street. They ask that the track be removed or be sunk low enough that it would not be a menace to vehicles.

Bamberger's right to use Lincoln avenue expired last November, when the terms of the franchise expired, and he has practically had nothing to do upon that street since that time.

The Ogden Rapid Transit company has been awaiting for an opportunity to extend its line over Lincoln avenue to the southwest part of town. A representative of the company has stated that in the event of Bamberger's tracks on Lincoln avenue being ordered removed by the city council, a street car line will be built at an early date.

Mr. Bamberger, it is vouched for by representatives of the road, will not attempt to enter the center of Ogden this year, and will remain at the south end of the city until he gets the road electrified, which will probably be done next year. A temporary depot will be erected at the corner of Lincoln avenue and Third street, and that will be the present terminal of the road and to which a line of buses will be operated from the center of the city during the summer.

The fight against Mr. Bamberger's entrance to the city, has grown to one of the hardest fights a railroad ever had in attempting to enter a city. No sooner had the controversy with the Union Pacific Railroad company been settled regarding the railroad crossing at Pacific avenue and Thirty-third street, than residents of the Lincoln avenue petitioned the council to prohibit Bamberger from using steam as power temporarily. Before definite action could be taken by the city council on this petition, Mr. Bamberger withdrew his application for the right to use steam on Lincoln avenue from the consideration of the council.

One noticeable fact in connection with the petition of the Lincoln avenue residents and which blocked the entrance of the interurban road to Ogden, is that most of its signers are employees of the Harmon system, which tried to block Bamberger's entrance into Ogden at Thirty-third street and Pacific avenue.

DR. R. S. JOYCE RESIGNS.

From Presidency of Board of Education—H. W. Gwilliam is President.

Ogden, May 16.—At a meeting of the board of education held last evening, Dr. R. S. Joyce tendered his resignation as president of that body, giving as his reason that he was going to move from the Second to the Fourth ward.

The resignation was accepted and H. W. Gwilliam was elected president and M. S. Browning was elected to fill the position of vice president, vice Gwilliam.

The treasurer reported \$20,790 cash balance on hand. Bills to the amount of \$1,600 were ordered paid.

The sanitary committee reported that there were now 235 pupils out of school on account of contagious and infectious diseases.

BURGULARY SUSPECTS ARRESTED.

Chief of Police Browning and Sheriff Wilson returned last evening from Brigham City, to which place they went yesterday afternoon to get a couple of suspected burglars who were arrested in that town on Wednesday night by Sheriff Josephson. The men gave the names of George Williams and Frank Maguire, and are suspected of being the burglars who robbed the residence of D. F. Steele on south Washington avenue the early part of the week.

The two suspects were arrested while they were trying to saw the bars of the jail in an effort to liberate four other members of their gang who had been held in the Boxelder county jail for some days upon the charge of committing a number of crimes. Ten minutes later he arrested McKeever, who had the missing wheel in his possession. Arriving at the police station before police court had adjourned, the prisoner was taken before the court. McKeever pleaded guilty and received his sentence of 60 days within 30 minutes from the time that he first set his eyes upon the bicycle and decided to rid off with it.

BOGUS DOLLARS.

A number of bogus dollars have been found in circulation in Ogden during the past few days, all generally being passed in hotels or to street car conductors. The coins are of the date of 1874, and are marked "San Francisco." They are made of metal that has a hollow ring and are very much lighter than the regular dollar pieces. The general appearance of the coins show that they were turned out by an expert, who had paid careful attention to every little detail.

He went quickly to the telephone and succeeded in calling up Sheriff Josephson and Deputy Wright, who arrived in a short time, and captured all three of the night visitors and gave them free lodging near their friends.
