LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THE TWO DAYS' MEETINGS.—This morning, at ten o'clock, the Two Days' Meetings, appointed to be held in this city, commenced in the Tabernacle. The assembly was large, comfortably filling the building.

The congregation was addressed by Presidents Young and Smith; the remarks of both were full of rich, practical instruction, and calculated, if observed, to improve any people, spiritually, socially, temporally and in every sense of the word.

President Young discoursed upon the great necessity of the people living closer to, and more absolutely in accordance with, the precepts of the gospel of Christ, that they may enjoy the light and spirit thereof, that its influence and power may control them in all the affairs of life; that they may know more of God, and be prepared for immortality, exaltation and glory.

President Smith discoursed on the advisability of forming co-operative stock herds, the education of the young, the support of schools, and other subjects of equal importance, pertaining to the everyday life and affairs of the people of these valleys.

THE STAGE ROBBERS ARRIVED.—The prisoners McKay, St. Ledger and Heath were brought to town last evening about five o'clock. They were taken to Provo on Thursday by Sheriff Casler and were there handed over to the custody of the U. S. Marshal. They are now confined in the city prison.

McKay was, not long since, proprietor of the Revere House, and St. Ledger was also well known in this city. Heath was formerly a U. S. soldier.

A rumor was current in town, this afternoon, that St. Ledger had taken poison. The report arose from the fact of his being taken suddenly and violently ill. Medical assistance was called, and it was suspected that he had poisoned himself, he was put under chloroform and a stomach pump applied, when it was discovered that the suspicion was incorrect.

RELEASE AND APPOINTMENT.—Elder Ralph Thompson has been released from his duties as Traveling Elder in the Durham and Newcastle Conference, and appointed Traveling Elder in the London Conference. *Mill. Star, Oct. 14th.*

MUSEUM AND MENAGERIE.—An additional attraction will be provided for the public at this interesting and growing institution. Prof. Otto Bosco, the great Magician has been engaged by the proprietor to give some of his wonderful performances, on Monday the 31st inst. Prof. Bosco's reputation, as an illusionist, is almost worldwide. He has performed before a number of the crowned heads of Europe. He gave some entertaining exhibitions of his skill in the President Young Hotel yesterday. He is engaged at the Museum for one week only.

A BIG YIELD.—Brother Thomas S. Smith, of Farmington, had a yield of 316 gallons of excellent sorghum, from one acre and a quarter of land; the present season. This is 250 gallons to the acre. This is unusually large.

Too TRUE.—A few days since we alluded to a report that a young man named Hiram Thornton, of Smithfield, Cache County, had been murdered somewhere in Montana. This report is confirmed. He was murdered at a place called Smith's Ranch; shot through the head. The hope of plunder led to the commission of the deed as the young man was known to have had money on his person previous to the murder and, when his body was discovered, it was found that he had been robbed. We expect to give full particulars shortly.

THE MERCHANT'S EXCHANGE AND NEWS ROOM.—A preliminary meeting for the purpose of establishing the above named institution was held last evening, at the office of Goni & Woodward, East Temple St. Resolutions were adopted, and the meeting adjourned until Tuesday evening next, at half-past seven o'clock, in the Hall over Faust's Livery Stable, Second South St., when it is hoped there will be a sufficient number present to effect a permanent organization.

FIRE.—Last evening, about eight o'clock, a kerosene lamp exploded in the news depot of Mr. James Dwyer, and set fire to a large amount of books and papers. The fire spread very rapidly but, luckily, it was principally confined to a quantity of books and stationary inside and behind the counter. A number of willing hands were soon on the spot and the counter and its contents were carried into the street and the flames inside the store extinguished.

Mr. Dwyer estimates his loss at about \$800.

RETURNED.—Bros. Saugiovanni and Urnsbach, of the Museum and Menagerie, whose departure on an exploring expedition to Skull Valley was noticed some days since, returned last night, bringing with them additional specimens for the Museum, to enrich the already very beautiful collection of geological treasures there exhibited.

Professor Barlow, under whose critical and learned inspection they have passed, says: "They are principally madrepore, astral and cyathophylloid coral, with some specimens of sea anemone, mollusks (large polyps of Paludicola lived, and others of the sea anemone, and may add a new chapter, or at all events, important information, to any knowledge of the former condition of these interesting valleys."

District Court.—The case of Englebrecht, & Co., versus Peter Clinton, and others for the abatement of a liquor establishment is in progress. There was some difficulty in unsealing a jury, yesterday, for this case. Ultimately, however, one, which was thought suitable, was sworn. A significant feature in this case is that there are no Mormons in it, and having been peremptorily challenged by the plaintiff's counsel.
